### EDUCATION BOARD DIVIDES BIG MELON

FRIDAY MORNING JULY 9 1920

Cool Million Granted by Controllers Allocated to School Buildings.

### LESS THAN EXPECTED

Administrator Pearse Gives Reasons Why Sum Was Not \$1,385,800 Asked.

Ornamental work on the Pantages Theatre, on the union station, and partly on the board of education and university buildings recommences this morning, the Canada Wire & Iron Co. having granted the 85c demand of having granted the 85c demand of the union. Hours and conditions are to be settled later. Work on Loew's Theatre is still delayed. Inside ornamental iron construction on other buildings remains untouched. This was the situation in the strike of the Ornamental Iron Workers up to 10 o'clock last night.

Colonel Cowan, manager of the Luxfer Prism Company, which has charge of the inside iron work on Loew's Theatre, stated to The World yesterday afternoon that if he was to pay more than 70c an hour he could not continue in business. He further stated that the fact that bricklayers

stated that the fact that bricklayers were receiving \$1 an hour by agree-ment formed no criterion for the orna-mentalists, the bricklayers' time being regulated by climatic conditions, and the ornamentalists, being on the inside construction work, were not hindered by rain or any climatic conditions; in fact, inside men could work the whole time, outside men only part time at the best.
