The labouring man gives his honest, hard labour, in exchange for his employer's money. This is an equitable, or fair exchange, in which each receives benefit. Now these earnings of the labouring man are his own; that is agreed upon. The next consideration is, what is to be done with these earnings? Let us suppose a man to earn ten, twelve, or thirteen shillings a week, and to have a wife and three children. He brings his money to his wife, who lays it out to the best advantage, adding to it any little sum scraped up by herself and her children during the week. With this sum, nay with a smaller, if the wife is a good manager, want has been kept from the door. But, suppose twelve shillings and ten-pence of the week's wages are made to undergo the process of transmutation, and the remaining two-pence is brought to the wife, to the sole support of the family—(I have known such a sum to be brought

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
