HAZEN'S BROKEN PROMISES
SCORED AT SACKVILLE RALLYRousing Liberal Meeting Last Night Passed Strong Resolutions
Condemning the Provincial Government

Sackville, N. B., May 14.—Though advertised solely as a club meeting tonight's Liberal rally here filled the hall to the doors. Much enthusiasm prevailed and the splendid speeches by A. B. Copp and C. M. Leger brought forth round after round of cheers. Both men were in excellent form and showed up the inconsistencies and blunders of the Conservatives in local politics in great style.

During the meeting resolutions were passed expressive of confidence in Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Ottawa administration, Messrs. Hughes and Laurier, the local opposition and the Westland members. All the resolutions were received with the heartiest applause on their presentation.

Mr. Leger began his speech with complimentary references to Mr. Copp and his excellent service to the Liberal cause. Passing on, he reminded the audience of many pre-election promises of the provincial Conservatives, none of which had been fulfilled. Mr. Hazen did not, he said, keep his promise in regard to the highway law which, as now existing, bears heavily on the pockets of particularly of people in small districts.

Then the Conservatives boasted of their feelings for the farmers, yet one of their earliest deeds on taking office was to reduce the allowance for agricultural affairs. Mr. Leger then took up the promises of economy made by Mr. Hazen and went on to show that the government had voted \$300,000 more of the people's money than was voted in 1905 under Liberal rule and had increased the estimates each year since taking office, through the revenue having been increased by \$130,000 by Liberal efforts.

He then went into the school book fare at length. He showed that gross partisanship had been displayed in the selection of vendors, that the expenses of handling, storing and transporting books will be great, and that the pockets of the people. The horse importation was condemned, and Mr. Leger also denounced the rate of interest of the government in regard to Factory Inspector McMullin.

As to the germicide of Westland, he said that there had been no demand for it in the county, but that he did not fear the outcome of an election whenever it may come. "Yet surely they were doing," he said, "have I felt so anxious to enter an election?"

In his opening remarks Mr. Copp drew attention to Mr. Hazen's course in reference to the highway act. Mr. Hazen promised, prior to the elections, that the first step would be to introduce a new act, yet none has been put into force up to the present. It was also claimed that under the old government the roads were collected to provide for the roads if they were properly expended. Why, then, was it necessary in the new act, passed, Mr. Copp asked, for Mr. Hazen to increase the poll tax and nearly double the property tax? Under the Liberals a man taxed on \$5,000 would pay \$6.00 and under the economical Conservatives he must pay \$10.00. Yet the Conservatives profess a great regard for the people's interests.

Mr. Copp went on to cite a case in this parish in which just prior to the dominion elections a Conservative thought to incline towards the Liberals, was given road work by James Smith, highway superintendent, but when it was learned

A Peculiar Flower
One of the most peculiar flowers known to the world grows on the edges of a volcano in Central America. The Indians, believing that the crater of the volcano is the entrance to hell, have called the flower "the rose of hell." It is a large blossom of solid wood and resembles a gnarled knot of a tree. It has, however, petals of bark and of wood, and its outline, in the rough, resembles those of a flower.

The petals are not only concave in form, like the petals of a flower, but they also have delicate lines traced on the inside like the veins in a leaf. This strange wooden flower has a light, string stem about a foot long. The flower is dark brown in color; the blossom is about 12 inches in diameter and the whole grows on a tree of very large size. These trees are found in the crevices of the volcano.

LAYMEN'S MISSION WORK

Two Meetings in the Interest of the Movement Held in St. John Last Evening

A conference of committees of the churches interested in the Laymen's Missionary Movement, was held last evening in the school room of St. John's (Stone) church. Hon. J. G. Forbes presided, and there was a good attendance. Short practical addresses were delivered by R. W. Allen, secretary of the Anglican branch of the movement in Canada, and by J. N. Harvey, representing the Methodists. Mr. Allen devoted his attention to the importance of the interdenominational phase of the movement and laid stress on the fact that it was not an organization for collection funds but to stimulate effort in the churches.

Mr. Harvey spoke in particular on the best methods of organization in the churches and advocated a system of small committees to wait on all the men connected with a church to press the claims of the movement. He contended that it was only a matter of education to secure systematic subscriptions.

W. A. Storer also gave an interesting address on the recent congress in Toronto, at which he was a delegate. After the addresses a conference was held by Mr. Allen and questions were put and answered.

Rev. W. T. Stachhouse, representing the Baptist portion of the Laymen's Missionary movement gave an interesting address to a fair sized audience of men in the Main street Baptist church last evening. The pastor, Rev. David Hutchinson, presided, and Rev. H. H. Nobles, pastor of the Victoria street Baptist church, assisted in the service. At the close a number of questions were asked and an interesting discussion took place.

PROVINCIAL NEWS

New Brunswick

A large two story building for the Port Elgin Trading Company is being erected near the N. B. and P. E. I. station in that town.

The Moncton Hospital now boasts of one of the most modern operating tables manufactured in America. The table is the gift of P. McDougall, manager of the Moncton branch of the Royal Bank of Canada.

The largest catch of fish that was ever taken in the Baie Verte waters in one day was landed there on Saturday, when some thing like two thousand barrels were brought ashore by Port Moncton factory and Mr. King's factories on the opposite side of Port Elgin river. This amount was almost more than they could handle with the help they had, hence they had to work all night Saturday and most of Sunday, and even then the fishermen could not keep the nets clean. They fished faster than they could take them out.

The Calais correspondent of the Bahgor Commercial says:—"The exemplification of the third rank by the team from Union Lodge, Knights of Pythias, before an assembly of that body's knights in Masonic hall, St. Stephen, Wednesday evening, May 2, was very pleasing to all. The various parts in the beautiful drama were ably and neatly rendered and the dressing of the degree was handsome. Members of the order were present from Eastport, Madras, Woodland, St. Stephen and Calais. Following the work a banquet prepared by the ladies of Victoria temple, Pythian Sisters, was served. It was a free pass and speeches were made and a social interest enjoyed. The St. John boys returned home by Thursday morning's train well pleased with their reception on the border."

Says the Moncton Transcript:—"The growing importance of Moncton as a revenue earning point on the I. C. R. is annually shown. The general impression is that Moncton is absolutely a free pass point, so far as the I. C. R. is concerned, but this is not so. The passenger earnings from tickets at Moncton in April amounted by \$2,000 above of the corresponding month last year. The revenue now at Moncton alone is between 60 and 70 per cent, in excess of that seven years ago at the same point. It is gratifying to learn that the I. C. R. general revenue for the first two weeks of April showed an encouraging increase being over the corresponding weeks of last year."

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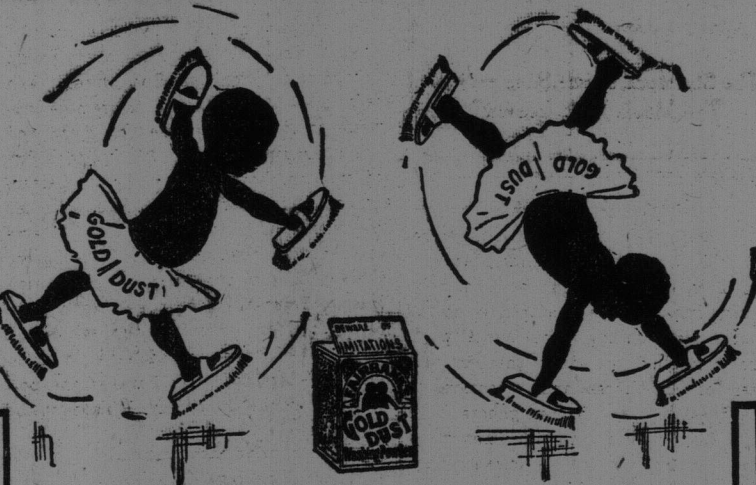
