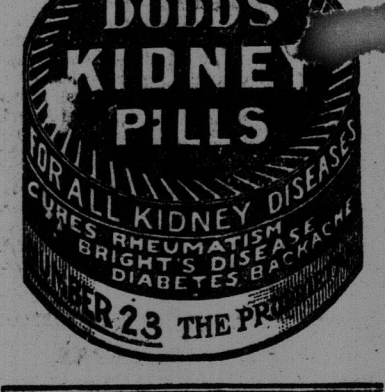

Canada's Naval Policy

The history of the war shows that a great mistake was made in not carrying out the naval policy agreed upon at the conference held in London on the early summer of 1911, at which Sir Wilfrid Laurier represented Canada, and which the parts to be played by the Canadian and Australian fleets were defined. Australia persevered in this policy and the result was a fleet of ships which played a useful part in the war. The Australian correspondent of the London Times has pointed out that the Australians are satisfied with the work of their fleet, and are convinced that the policy of maintaining a fleet is right, and will never be abandoned in favor of flying squadrons or direct contributions.

Canada made a beginning but unfortunately the work was interrupted. The parliament of Canada in 1909 unanimously endorsed the policy which Australia has carried out. A Naval Act was passed, a naval college was established and the Niobe and Rainbow were purchased as training vessels. Arrangements were made for the creation of a

fleet of cruisers and destroyers. Tenders were received in May, 1911, and the Canadian minister went to England to consult with the British minister as to the merits of these tenders.
Then came the general election of 1911, which necessitated the carrying out of the policy for the few summer months. The Borden government came into power in October, and the policy of dealing with the tenders it abandoned. The policy agreed upon, and did nothing for the tenders, which it had decided to make a contribution for the building of three Dreadnoughts for the British navy.
The course of the war shows that the Dreadnought policy was wrong and that the policy of building a fleet of Canadian cruisers and destroyers was right.
Of course this does not mean that the Dreadnoughts are useless. They have an important work to do. But the British supremacy in Dreadnoughts was established without our aid. There are thirty-eight British Dreadnoughts as compared with Germany's twenty-one. If there had been forty-one British Dreadnoughts the result would have been no different.
But if the policy agreed upon in 1909 had been carried out Canada might have played a part similar to that of Australia. It would not have been necessary to use the assistance of Australia and Japan in defending the coasts of Canada. Canadian cruisers might have also played an important part in conveying Canadian troops across the Atlantic. Canadian destroyers might have been protection against attacks of submarines in our own waters.

The Toronto News says that the German submarine campaign has failed. True. But how? We have not been informed fully as to the methods used by the British Admiralty, but we cannot be wrong in believing that destroyers and not small craft have played the very important part. The work was not done by Dreadnoughts. Important though the Dreadnoughts are, they have their own particular duty. Canada ought to have done as Australia did and it is certain that Canada will eventually carry out the policy which was begun in 1909 but was interrupted and abandoned by the present government for purely selfish reasons and to please the Quebec Nationalists—Toronto Star.

NEBRASKA IN THE LONG AGO

What is Now a Dry Plain Was Once the Bed of a Great Sea.
South of the Platte River, opposite North Bend, Neb., the bluffs are conspicuous and consist of loess and glacial drift, overlying the Benton shale. This shale was formed when Nebraska was at the bottom of a sea. Evidence of the former presence here of sea water is found in the fossil shells of oysters and other animals that live in salt water and the bones of such sea monsters as the mosasaurus.

A comparison of these ancient conditions with those of the present day indicates the slow, continuous change that is now and always has been in progress. Where the tourist now travels comfortably over a dry plain these monsters sported in the water of the sea long ago. On the shores of this ancient sea lived equally strange beasts and birds of types that have long been extinct, and over its water sailed great flying dragons—Ee pterodactyls.
The animals of that day were strikingly different from those of the present. The birds, unlike any now living, had jaws armed with teeth. The monsters of the air then were not in fact birds, but flying reptiles, whose fore limbs had been modified into wings by the enormous elongation of fingers between which stretched thin membranes like the wings of a bat. These flying dragons, some of which had a stretch of eighteen feet, were carnivorous. They were animated engines of destruction that somewhat forcibly suggest the modern war airplanes of which they were in a sense the prototypes—Geological Survey Bulletin.

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ASIA MINOR COPPER IS SOUGHT BY ENEMY

Almost Inexhaustible Supply Obtainable From Arghana Maden Mine

London, Oct. 14.—The Daily Mail points out that the success of Germany in establishing connections with Turkey would mean the solution of Germany's copper problem as virtually inexhaustible supplies of the metal would be available from the Arghana Maden mine in Asia Minor. This mine, although hitherto much neglected, is one of the richest mines in the world, the newspaper says, and under German management it would soon be shipping copper wholesale over the new Bagdad railway. "Turkey," the Daily Mail adds "could also be very helpful in the matter of cotton although she would hardly be able to furnish all of this staple needed by Germany."
