ENGLISH CLERGYMAN BECOMES PUBLICAN

Archbishop of York and Rural Dean Sign Vicar's Taver Register

MIDDLEBROUGH, England, June 12.—Rev. J. L. Kyle, vicar of Carlton, 11 miles from here, keeps the Fox and Hounds in the village, and makes it his business to see that his customers do not drink sufficient beer to become drunk.

"I determined to buy the place," the vicar said, "when I had so much difficulty in obtaining refreshment as I went preaching up and down the country. The day I bought the inn a brother publican offered me £400 more than I had paid for it."

"It was not long before I gave up my Sunday license and sacrificed a further £400 on the purchase of the house. My plan was to cleanse my parish of the drinking hordes who came out from Middlebrough on Sundays."

"I have been attacked from both sides. Church people said that a vicar should not be the landlord of an inn, but I asked them who was better able to run a public-house than a parson. I called a parish meeting, and the people decided that they preferred me as the landlord to any other person."

The vicar is proud of the neat appearance of his inn and of the sign, which was painted by his wife. In the visitors' book at the inn are the following signatures: "Cosmo Ebor (Archbishop of York), and Henry C. Holmes, rural dean."

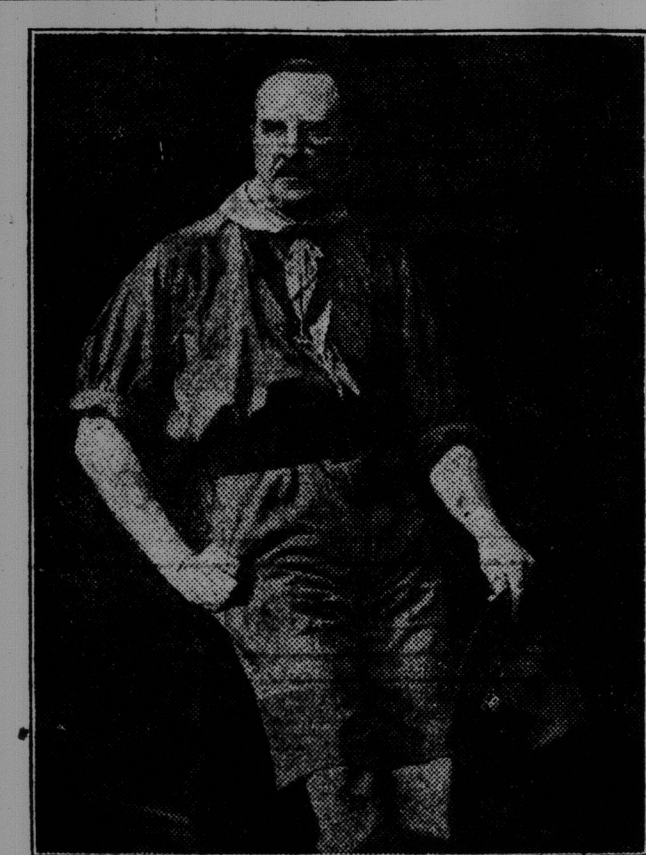

SIR ALFRED PICKFORD, BART., Overseas and migration commissioner of the Boy Scouts association, who will be in Saint John on next Wednesday after a tour of Canada. Sir Alfred was formerly chief commissioner of the Scouts for India, where he was for some 30 years in business. He was Sheriff of Calcutta in 1920, was a member of the Bengal Legislative Assembly and was a major in the Calcutta Light Horse. He was knighted in 1921 for his services to the Empire through scouting.

DRUSE REBELLION IS NOT YET ENDED

Sultan Atrash Expected to Resist French to Bitter End

BEIRUT, Syria, June 12.—The French military authorities here express surprise that the Druse tribesmen have not reacted since the French captured their southern capital, Saida, a week ago.

The French headquarters staff holds the impression that the back of the Druse rebellion has been broken, but have no illusions, however, as to the intentions of the Sultan, which, the French do not include surrender, but rather resistance to the bitter end.

It is said that the Sultan's followers do not share his uncompromising views and daily are making peace with the French in the Debel Druse. The only attempt at reaction during the week was an operation personally conducted by the Sultan against a French scouting detachment.

In the rest of the country there have been a few skirmishes, between bandits and French troops and around Damascus a few isolated cases of brigandage. All is said to be quiet in Greater Lebanon.

KILLS HIS WIFE

New Jersey Carpenter Seriously Wounded Mother-in-Law With Shotgun

SPARK, N. J., June 12.—Lucas Slockbower, 22-year-old carpenter, yesterday shot and killed his wife, Edna, and seriously wounded his mother-in-law, Mrs. Marie Krast, 56 years old.

The couple's two children, Edna, four, and Ruth, three, told police their parents, who for some time has disagreed, quarreled violently in the morning and shot them as they fled.

Police are hunting for the husband in the wild hills of Northwest Jersey. Miss H. Vyvian Vail, Ottawa, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Vail, is in the city visiting relatives.

to do with the relations of the Dominion to the Empire, pointed out that this country was not independent, but relied on the Imperial Government to redress grievances of Canadians against foreign countries.

WAS BUSY WEEK
The National Chapter began its sessions at the Admiral Beatty hotel on a Monday night and since that time an immense amount of business has been disposed of.

During the week the organization will endeavor to raise \$25,000 to complete the half million dollar war memorial fund which the I. O. D. E. proposes to establish as a Dominion Jubilee celebration, next year being the sixtieth year of the confederation of the original provinces.

Among the resolutions which have been adopted by the convention are several having for their object the furthering of educational work; to maintain and increase loyalty to Canadian and British ideals and institutions; the discouraging of Communist propaganda; the banning of pernicious and otherwise undesirable publications printed in the United States; the greater use of British-made films in motion picture houses; restoring the former Canadian military status by popularizing, enlisting and drilling by young men; better care of disabled soldiers; a campaign by churches against a United States association which is carrying on a propaganda work against religion; the reform of the grouping system among immigrants in the west in order that new Canadians may be closer touch with Canadian life and customs.

U. S. COMMENT ON THE PACIFIC

Commenting on the announcement that the Canadian Pacific Steamships, Limited, are laying down two new combination liners and five freight boats, New York shipping men take this as an indication that the Pacific services of this company are to be expanded.

It is fortunate that the American Oriental Mail Line has passed into the hands of the Dollar group rather than into those of a group with limited resources, they state. The Dollar group, it was pointed out, will be able to meet whatever competition may be offered in the Pacific trade.

The Canadian Pacific are fully alive to the importance of their line likely to meet on the Pacific and elsewhere. Whether they use the ships on the Atlantic or the Pacific there will be sufficient cargoes for their holds to justify their being in service.

2 PARSONS CLASH

RED BLUFF, Calif., June 12.—Following a quarrel in the First Baptist church here, Rev. J. Brooks Frost, resident pastor, and the Rev. G. Higginbottom, evangelist, exchanged a score of blows on the church steps.

Both were bleeding when separated. "Trouble arose in the congregation when a faction opposing Mr. Frost on the ground that his advocacy of 'praying for the sick' and other practices were contrary to Baptist tenets stirred the church."

Mr. Frost mobilized his own supporters and marched to the church. When Mr. Higginbottom entered the fracas is not clear.

According to the police, Mr. and Mrs. Heftefinger in the hurry of obtaining tickets, failed to notice that the jewels were missing. Later Mrs. Heftefinger discovered her loss and they returned to the hotel and notified the management, according to the police. Both believe the jewel case was left in the taxi.

The missing jewelry consists of 14 diamond rings, a brooch set with small diamonds, a diamond bracelet, three pearl necklaces and a pink topaz ring.
