Banquet Tendered Retiring
Secretary of Body at
Fredericton

ENFORCEMENT OF ACT IS COMMENTED ON

Defeat of Veniot Govern-
ment Laid Chiefly to Work
of Temperance Society

FREDERICTON, June 29.—The New Brunswick Temperance Alliance last night tendered to Rev. Thomas Marshall, retiring secretary of the N.B. Alliance, a complimentary banquet in the vestry of the Wilket United Church. About 100 persons were present. His Worship Mayor Clark occupied the chair. Donald Fraser of Plaster Rock was unable to be present, having been called to Edmunston on business.

The guest of the evening, Rev. Thomas Marshall, was on the right of the chairman and Vice-president C. N. Vroom of St. Stephen was on his left. Others seated at the same table were W. B. Evans, M. L. A., of Miramichi; C. Atkinson, M.P.P., of Fredericton; Rev. H. A. Good, of Saint John; Rev. C. T. Clark, of Fairville, and Rev. Archibald Sutherland of Chipman, who succeeds Rev. Marshall as secretary. "The Guest of the Evening" was proposed by Rev. Dr. J. S. Sutherland of Fredericton and replied to by Rev. Mr. Marshall.

The tenor of the addresses was regret because of the departure of Rev. Marshall for Montreal and congratulations to him for the great work which he had accomplished for the cause of prohibition in this province.

GUEST REPLIES

Rev. Mr. Marshall said that he had enjoyed his work and was pleased at being able to assist in the bringing about of prohibition in New Brunswick. For the future he held out the prospect of the advance of prohibition in all parts of the world.

Several speakers, including Mayor Clark and C. N. Vroom, expressed the opinion that the temperance cause had been the dominating influence in the defeat of the Veniot government and that the temperance cause was the only one that had stood firm for the enforcement of prohibition, even at the loss of votes according to the statement of Mayor Clark.

SOME DISSATISFACTION

Mr. Vroom made mention of the fact that politics entered into the administration of the Act and that everything had not been satisfactory lately, there having been political appointment of inspectors and appointments of vendors unsuitable to their office.

Mr. Evans, as a member of the Legislature, referred to the statements that politics entered into the administration of the Prohibition Act. He reminded his hearers that in every constituency there were those not in favor of prohibition and the fact made administration difficult. A principle of politics was "to the victor belong the spoils" and spoils meant appointments to office. Many applicants for appointments were not fitted but they were found so they would be removed.

HEGLED HIMSELF TO THE ENFORCEMENT OF THE ACT

He pledged himself to the enforcement of the Act.

URGES EDUCATION

The new secretary, Rev. Mr. Sutherland, made an appeal for increased support to the Alliance, particularly among the youth of the province, to make known the principles and aims of the Alliance.

CHIEF GIVEN FREE HAND

E. C. Atkinson, M.L.A., stated in the course of a brief address that the chief inspector must have the enthusiastic support of the temperance people. He had been given a free hand to enforce the Act and could not do so without adequate support.

Poland Reiterates League Seat Demand

BERLIN, June 29.—The Vossische Zeitung today publishes an interview with M. Zaleski, Polish Foreign Minister, dealing with Poland's desire for peace and the country's attitude toward the League of Nations.

"Poland, like all Europe since the war," said M. Zaleski, "wants peace which is necessary to internal reconstruction of Poland. Our attitude toward the League of Nations and membership in it, is unchanged. Our demand for a permanent seat in the council is not indicated by national egoism, but by realization that candid cooperation with the other league powers, is imperative. Such co-operation is impossible so long as Poland is unable to have an active part in League of Nations decisions."

Ferguson Laughs At Cabinet Suggestion
