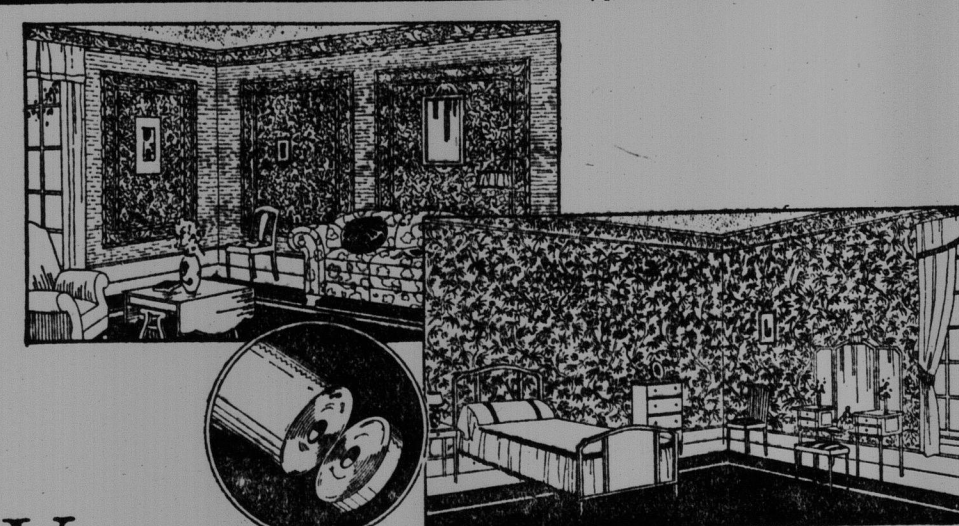

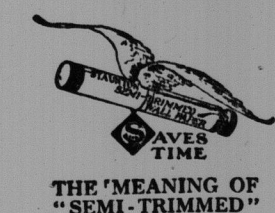

### SAYS OUTLOOK IN ENGLAND BETTER

T. Malcolm McAvity, London manager of T. McAvity & Sons, Ltd., who arrived home yesterday on a visit after three years absence was interviewed on conditions in England. The general outlook on the business situation in England was more optimistic, Mr. McAvity said. This changed attitude was brought about mainly through the adoption of the Dawes Reparations Plan, and the expectation of better business on the continent.

As for unemployment, there was a bit in England, Mr. McAvity said, but added that there was none in Belgium, little in France and very little in Germany. There was some fear felt by steel and iron manufacturers in England that the proposed trade agreement, now in process of negotiation, between Germany and France would kill Britain's market for steel and iron in France and Belgium, the source of supply being transferred from England to Germany.

Regarding the future of the Labor Administration at present guiding the destinies of England, Mr. McAvity said but little. The general opinion of the people of England, he thought, was for a return to Conservatism. Mr. McAvity did not know how long his stay would be here. He was not accompanied by Mrs. McAvity, who is a daughter of Sir Douglas Haas.

### CAR DRIVER GETS 20 DAYS IN JAIL

For driving a car while under the influence of liquor George Levine was sentenced by Magistrate Allingham, last night, to seven days in jail with a further sentence of 20 days in jail if he fails to pay costs.
