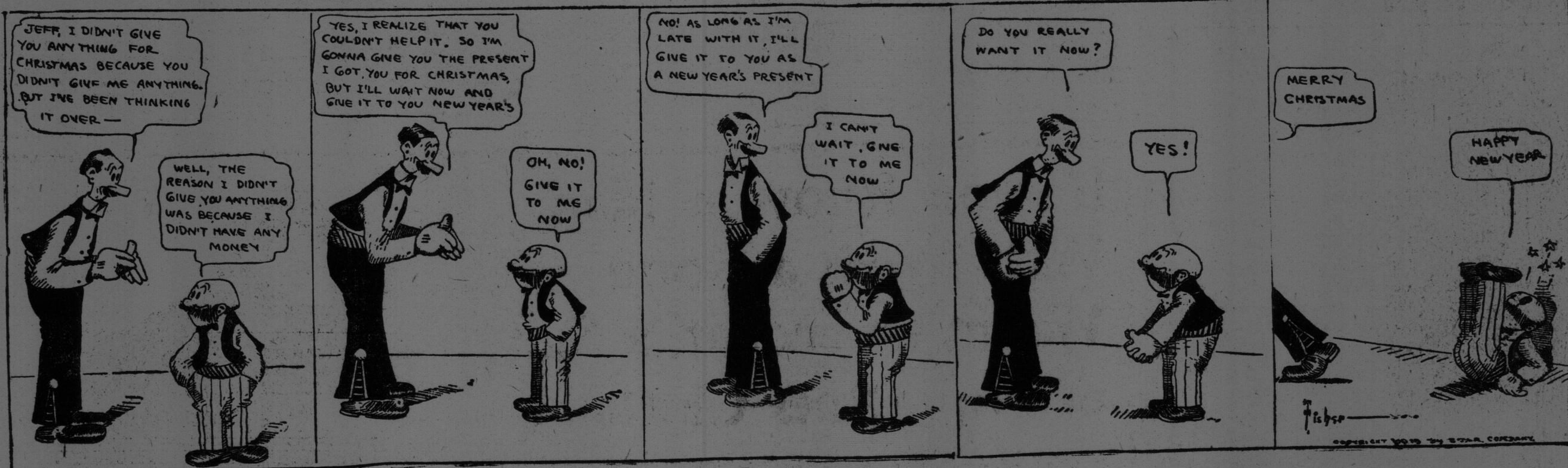

Milwaukee, Jan. 7.—Levinsky's youth with a battling name must be a glutton for work, or else Daniel Morgan is working a good thing to deal Levinsky's has certainly had a strenuous time of it in the last year, having had two dozen fights and against men much heavier than himself. Levinsky, whose former name was Barney Williams, is only a lightweight at best, scaling about 165 pounds and if it becomes necessary he can do 160 at three o'clock in a pinch.

At no time was Petrosky able to outbox him.

## New England League Shaken Up.

Boston, Jan. 8.—The New England League circuit for next year was shaken up at a meeting of the league today.

The franchise formerly held in Brockton was ordered transferred to Lewiston, Maine. The New Bedford Club will be moved to Fitchburg, and the team which represented Fall River last year will return to Haverhill, where it played two seasons ago.

The new circuit comprises Worcester, Fitchburg, Lawrence, Lynn, Portland, Haverhill, Lewiston and Lowell. A schedule committee was appointed to draw up the playing schedule for next season. It was voted that this schedule should open April 29 and close September 12, allowing 121 games. A meeting to act on the schedule committee's report will be held on March 3.

The league voted to give \$100 toward a fund being raised as a benefit to Charley Gansel, former catcher of the Boston Nationals.

## The 1916 Futurity.

New York, Jan. 8.—Nearly every district in the United States where it is possible to gallop thoroughbreds is represented in the nominations for the Futurity of 1916, announced by the Coney Island Jockey Club, Canada also has come to the front with a liberal support in the state have been encouraged by the fact that the Futurity was held at Saratoga last year for the first time since 1910. That the race will take place in 1916 seems assured, and it is not without the bounds of probability that it will be run at its old home at Sheepshead Bay.

Club, but it is understood that the Saratoga Racing Association stands ready to stage the event in case racing is not resumed at Sheepshead Bay.

In the list of nominators there are eighteen new subscribers to the two-year-old races. John E. Madden is the largest individual nominator, with 101 mares named from his Harbinger place in Kentucky. Henry T. Oxnard has named fifty-nine and Harry Payne Whitney is third, with fifty-two. August Belmont, chairman of the Jockey Club, has named forty-five, and next in line comes Prince McKinney's Wyckoff stud, with twenty-nine named. Mr. McKinney was an extensive purchaser at the dispersal of the horses of the late James R. Keene, and he established his breeding place at the Kingston Farm in Kentucky. He is the most notable of the newcomers to the Futurity.

Hart Brown, of Kentucky; James Butler, the New York turfman and breeder; Clifford A. Cochran of New York, who took up racing last year; Thomas Cushing, a Canadian breeder; W. H. Ford, of Texas, H. C. Hallenbeck, the New York sportsman who has been operating a big stable for a few seasons; C. L. Hervey, another Canadian; the Kuyken-dall Ranch of Texas, Dr. A. W. McAlister of Missouri, M. P. Mattingly, Jr., of Kentucky; O. P. Robinson of Oklahoma, Harley H. Seaton of New Jersey and Price McKinney the Cleveland sportsman who is proprietor of the Wyckoff stud.
