

Steamer Lost Near Halifax

MOTHER, SON AND SERVANT DIE

Overcome in Hotel Fire in Ontario Village

HUSBAND'S EFFORTS VAN

Ties Hard to Rescue Wife and Othen But Fails—Smoke In Early Hours of The Morning Arouses Him

Slaying of French Editor Arouses Storm

WOMAN AVENGING HUSBAND

Paris, March 17.—The fall of the French cabinet was this morning generally regarded as likely to be brought about by the assassination of Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro, by Madame Calliaux, wife of the minister of finance.

Mrs. Calliaux conferred lengthily this morning with President Poincaré at the Palace of the Elisee and a cabinet council was called for later in the day, when it was to be decided whether the ministers should resign in a body or an attempt be made to reorganize the cabinet with M. Calliaux left out.

Madame Calliaux when she was driven from the police station to St. Lazare prison after committing the crime, was accompanied by Arthur Leymarie, chief private secretary of the minister of war. She converted quiet, calmly, with Mrs. Calliaux saying:

"My husband is one of the most honest of men. The press campaign which has been carried on against him for some time is absolutely frightful. I tremble every morning when I open the newspapers."

Mrs. Calliaux was formally charged today with the murder of Calmette, who she shot to death last night in retaliation for that newspaper's attacks upon her husband. While the formal charges were being filed against Mrs. Calliaux, mobs paraded the streets demanding the arrest of her husband and his execution. There were pathetic scenes when the minister of finance was allowed to meet and talk with his wife. Tears rolled down the cheeks of the statesman as he embraced Mme. Calliaux. He was in a state of almost complete collapse, as he repeated over and over again:

"Why did you do it? You have ruined my life, but I forgive you."

Mrs. Calliaux also broke down and sobbed. As the couple embraced and wept they heard through the barred windows of the jail, the minister of finance, printed in the morning papers, the names of persons cleared about St. Lazare prison and the Calliaux residence screaming:

"Calliaux is a murderer. Calliaux should be killed."

Mrs. Calliaux's anger had been increased to frenzy when Calmette published part of a love letter which Calliaux had written to her during their courtship days.

LATER Paris, March 17.—The French cabinet today decided to remain in office in spite of the resignation of Joseph Calliaux, minister of finance.
