A NEW BLACK FOX COMPANY FORMED

The organization of a million dollar silver black fox company, in which St. John men are largely interested, was completed here last evening. The company is the Canada Atlantic Fox Company, Ltd., capital stock \$1,000,000, of which \$700,000 is to be issued at present.

The directors and officers are: Sir Frederick Borden, Canning, N. S., president; D. C. McKay, Halifax, 1st vice; Fred J. Tabor, Boston, 2nd vice; J. Stanley Wedlock, Charlottetown, secretary; Thomas Nagle, St. John; B. M. Blacader, Windsor, N. S.; George F. Uring, Brookline, Mass.; William Cruse, Liverpool, England, and J. W. McKay, Halifax.

The company has purchased a ranch of 160 acres five miles from Charlottetown. Stock to the value of \$800,000 has been subscribed and fully paid up already and of this amount one-third was taken in St. John.

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY

Rev. Principal McKinnon of Halifax and Dr. A. S. Grant of Toronto, general superintendent of the Presbyterian Home Mission Board were the chief speakers at the Presbyterian General Assembly in Woodstock, Ont. last evening. Dr. Grant said that it was a disgrace to the church, that with all their wealth they were not doing more to evangelize the dominion and said that this was mainly due to the liquor traffic which, he maintained, was hindering the work of Christianizing Canada. He urged all Presbyterians to come out strongly against the traffic.

Rev. Dr. McKinnon deplored the fact that there were too few men in the mission field and said that there were 5, 314 places where the people would expect to find their Presbyterian minister preach on Sundays but that there were only 1,787 ministers to do the work. An earnest appeal was made to assembly delegates to make this year's assembly delegates will be made this year.
