## MORNING LOCALS

The assessment committee of the municipal council met yesterday afternoon to hear the complaint of the Partington Pulp & Paper Co., Ltd., that they had been over assessed. It is the opinion of some of the members that the amount collected was larger than the act allowed, and the matter will be before the council at the next meeting.

The annual reunion of the New Brunswick Military Veterans was held last night. Supper was served, and a programme enjoyed, after which the election of officers took place. Col. James Buchanan was elected president, J. B. McLean vice-president, J. L. Eagles, secretary, and G. George Clark, of the contracting firm of A. R. C. Clark & Son yesterday received a pair of other gloves from his employees.

The annual meeting of the Carpenters and Joiners' Union was held last night. The following officers were elected:—President, Charles Stewart; vice-president, W. W. Williams; treasurer, George Redmond; recording secretary, H. M. Pratt; financial secretary, J. L. Sugrue; warden, William McNulty. The business of asking for an increase in wages came up for discussion, but no action was taken.

Hon. J. L. Tweedie, of Chatham, formerly lieutenant-governor of the province, was at the City yesterday and was registered at the Royal. Mr. Tweedie said that business in his district was in an exceedingly prosperous condition, especially in lumber circles, which promised very well indeed for the winter months, the prices of grain and other commodities being high.

The grain shipments from the port of St. John for the month of December are: C. P. R. elevator, Sand Point, 1,201,143 bushels; I. C. R. elevator, North End, 447,886 bushels; total, 1,709,031 bushels.

## PROSPEROUS YEAR IN AMHERST

The Amherst News says:—There were upwards of three hundred houses built in Amherst in 1912 at a total cost approximating \$300,000, and still there is not a vacant dwelling within the town. Our total building operations included dwelling houses, new industries, extensions to existing industries, new business blocks and extensions thereto, will total over \$800,000. There is a special field of investment in Amherst in real estate and modern tenements that would carry a rental of from twelve to fifteen dollars a month.

The total cash paid for freight received at the I. C. R. station at Amherst for eleven months, ended November 30, 1911, totalled \$317,901. For the same period in 1912 the total cash deposits taken in for freight amounted in round numbers to \$423,903, making an increase of \$105,002 in one year.

The customs receipts for the eleven months ended Nov. 30, 1912, totalled \$112,612.28, against \$89,654.54 for the previous year, making an increase for eleven months of \$22,957.74.

The number of school children enrolled in 1911 in all the schools of the town totalled a little more than 1,100. In 1912 the enrollment shows over 1,000.

## MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

William Rockefeller, wanted as a witness in the investigations of the "money trust" committee at Washington, is said to have sailed from Jacksonville, Georgia, in an unknown steamer for an unknown port, accompanied by his wife and son and the latter's wife. The sergeant-at-arms of the house at Washington has tried in vain to serve a summons.

The will of Carl Pickard, stone manufacturer of Sackville, N. B., was filed yesterday. The estate was valued at \$102,300 and the executors are his wife, son Kenneth, and brother, Humphrey.

Harold Walker and Harold Short, cousins, aged eight years, broke through the thin ice on Sullivan's Pond, Dartmouth, yesterday. Short was rescued, but Walker drowned.

Ald. T. S. Baxter was declared elected mayor of Vancouver by acclamation yesterday. Former Mayor I. B. Taylor handed in his papers, but in the excitement of the moment forgot to sign them and was disqualified. Jonathan Rogers was also nominated, but his papers were rejected because of technical errors.

On representations made by the Canadian Shipping Federation to Hon. Mr. Hazen, it is expected that there will soon be appointed a commission to investigate pilotage matters.

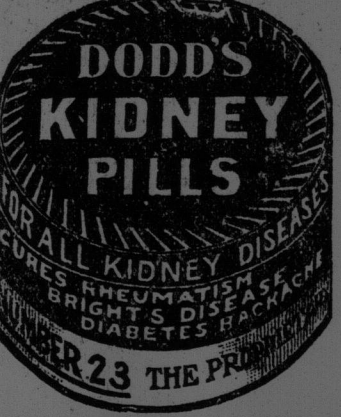
