A plan which is expected to save the city \$700 a year was recommended for adoption at the meeting of the commissioners at non today. In the past the cost of repairs to the piling at the entrance to the ferry floats has averaged \$1,900 a year and to lessen this the commissioners have decided to sheath the piling with oak planks.
