## FAMOUS GEMS OF PROSE

THE NORWICH (CONN) ELMS  
By Henry Ward Beecher

From a letter in "Towns and Trees," one of the "Star Papers" of 1853.

**B**UT if there were none of these rare conjunctions of hill, rock and plain, river and sea, Norwich would still be a beautiful place by virtue of its trees, and especially of those incomparably most magnificent of all earthly trees, elms! A village shaded by thoroughly grown elms cannot but be handsome. Its houses may be huts; its streets may be ribbed with rocks, or channelled with ruts; it may be as dirty as New York and as frigid as Philadelphia; and yet these vast, majestic tabernacles of the air would redeem it to beauty. These are temples, indeed, living temples, neither wasting old nor shattered by Time, that cracks and shatters stones, but rooting wider with every generation and casting a vaster round of grateful shadow with every summer.

We had rather walk beneath an avenue of elms than inspect the noblest cathedral that art ever accomplished. What is it that brings one into such immediate personal and exhilarating sympathy with venerable trees? One instinctively uncovers as he comes beneath them; he looks up with proud veneration into the receding and twilight recesses; he breathes a thanksgiving to God every time his cool foot falls along their shadows. They taken the imagination and mingle the olden time with the present.

Did any man of contemporary mood ever stand under an old oak or elm without thinking of other days—imagining the scenes that had transpired in their presence? These fast-mounting mounds seem to connect the past and the present to us as mountain ridges attract clouds from both sides of themselves. Norwich is remarkably enriched by these columnar glories, these mysterious lines that lead and intrude upon our eyes. No considerable street is destitute of them, and several streets are prolonged avenues of elms which might give a twinge of jealousy to old New Haven herself—climatic! Norwich Old Town, however, clearly has the preeminence. It is here that the most venerable, elms of the vastest stature and of every shape and delineation of grandeur. How a man can live there and ever get his eyes to the ground, I cannot imagine. One must needs walk with upturned face and during these moments of admiration of all air castles. And when passing underneath some monumental tree he looks afar up and sees the bird population, that breathes scarcely larger than humming-birds, dimly flitting about its secure hermitage and sending down a check that loses itself half way down to a thin whistle, it seems as though there were two worlds—in one and they in another.

## CAUSE OF THE FATAL COLLISION ON THE I.C.R.

The quest into the death of Harvey McDougall, of Indiantown, in the collision at Derby Junction on March 9 opened in Newcastle yesterday before Coroner M. S. Benson. John McDougall, Andrew Fox, of Indiantown; Dr. Robert Nicholson, Jas. W. Spencer of Moncton, brakeman on the Indiantown train; Frank DeBoo, of Sussex, express messenger; Alex. DeBoo, of Moncton, conductor of the branch train and Conductor Watts, of the Maritime express gave evidence and the inquest was adjourned until Wednesday.

Spencer and DeBoo told of their arrival at the junction ahead of time and of shutting on the main line contrary to the rules. Spencer said that on going to the branch line he had done some work about the train and was going back to close the switch but had not time before the crash came. If he had obeyed the rules and closed the switch when he should have done so or had left someone in charge the collision would not have occurred.

## GOOD GOVERNMENT TICKET IN FREDERICTON BEATEN

Fredericton, Mar. 13.—The civic election today resulted in a complete victory for the citizens' ticket, all the members of which were elected by substantial majorities. Out of a total electorate of 1,342 there were 1,174 votes cast. After the declaration of the poll by City Clerk McCready in City Hall, there were speeches by the victorious and defeated candidates and some personal remarks being made by the good government ticket.

The crowd gathered broke up in disorder. The crowd attacked the police who were arresting a couple of men and succeeded in getting them away from the policemen.

The main issue of the election was the enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act, and although clergymen and other prominent people took part in the campaign, the good government ticket was elected.

## FOR MORE IMMIGRANTS TO MARITIME PROVINCES

Ottawa, Mar. 13.—In the house today, F. D. Monk, moved, in amendment to go into committee of supply, that the construction of the Georgian Bay canal should be immediately commenced. After some discussion the amendment was ruled out of order as it involved an expenditure of money and could come only from the government.

Hon. Mr. Oliver in presenting the immigration estimates, said that in the first nine months of the present year 283,000 immigrants had come into Canada while last year the whole immigration totalled only 268,700.

The minister stated that a special effort was being made to induce suitable immigrants to settle in the maritime provinces. A party of immigrants would leave Britain shortly for Prince Edward Island, with the object of purchasing or renting farms, and an agent had been appointed to represent the island in Britain. An agent had been appointed from New Brunswick to endeavor to secure settlers for the east, and it was believed that this movement would result in bettering conditions.

Several members of the common council, the transportation and immigration officials, as well as members of the local shipping houses last night enjoyed a splendid dinner served in fine style aboard the S. S. Sarnia, of the Donaldson line. Addresses were given by Mayor Frink and others, complimenting the Donaldson line on having such a good line of steamers.

The Royal Kennebec Yacht Club, at a meeting held recently, decided to have a smoker on Thursday, March 23. This will be the last of these popular entertainments and social events of the season, and no doubt will afford as much pleasure to the members and their friends as those held in the past.

## MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES






## TEMPERANCE GROWS IN QUEBEC

The 22nd convention of the Quebec branch of the Dominion Alliance took place in Montreal yesterday. The report of Secretary Roberts showed that of the communities in the province 69 per cent were dry and 31 per cent had liquor license. The number of communities without license was 60 compared with 295 with license. It was also reported that on May 1 next there would be a general early closing movement throughout the province, except in Montreal and Quebec. The bars would close at 7 p. m. on Saturdays and 10 p. m. on week days. A request that a restaurant hotel should be constructed in Montreal was referred to a committee. Secretary Roberts quoted figures to show in Montreal there were ninety-six hotels, 353 cafes, 544 licensed grocers, or a total of 1212 liquor dealers.
