## LADY BYNG OF VIMY IN CITY TOMORROW

Governor-General's Wife to  
Sail For England on  
Montclare

Her Excellency, Lady Byng of Vimy, wife of the Governor-General of Canada, accompanied by Miss Walpole, lady-in-waiting, will sail from St. John tomorrow on the Montclare for England and will be away from Canada until July. The vice-regal party will travel to St. John in a special train of three cars which will arrive at about 2 o'clock and will proceed at once to West St. John, from where Lady Byng and Miss Walpole will embark just shortly before the boat sails. No special accommodation is being provided as the accommodation on the Montclare is sufficiently convenient and luxurious for even vice-regal patrons. Two rooms and a bathroom adjoining are being reserved for the distinguished passengers.

## DEATHS

### Joseph Pelletier.

Boston, March 26.—Hon. Joseph C. Pelletier, former district attorney of Suffolk county, from which office he was removed in 1922, died at his home here last night of pneumonia. His health had been failing, friends said, since the trial by the Supreme Court which resulted in his removal from office, after more than 16 years of continuous service, for malfeasance, misfeasance and nonfeasance. All these charges he denied. Joseph C. Pelletier was born in the Roxbury district of Boston in 1872, was educated at Boston College and was admitted to the bar in 1894. He attained prominence as a prosecutor in the case of Rev. Clarence V. Richardson, who was later executed for the murder of Avis Linnell. He was active in the Knights of Columbus and was national chief advocate of the order for several years. In 1920 Pope Benedict created him commander of the Order of St. Gregory. During the world war he received recognition from governments of France and Belgium for his activities.

### Joseph Rodgers.

Joseph Rodgers, a well known and highly respected citizen, died suddenly at his home, 283 Germain street, last night. He had just finished his supper when he collapsed, falling from his chair on which he was seated. He died within a few minutes. He had been sick for some time but had not considered his illness serious. He is survived by his wife and two sisters, both in the United States. The funeral will be held from Fitzpatrick's undertaking rooms on Saturday morning at 9:30 o'clock to St. John the Baptist church for high mass of requiem.

### Sydney Sugrue.

Word was received yesterday by James L. Sugrue of the death in New York of his nephew, Sydney Sugrue, son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Sugrue. The young man had up to recently been a student in dentistry at Columbia University, New York. He was born about 21 years ago in Sydney, N. S., whether his parents had removed from St. John. The family subsequently removed to the United States. The body will be brought to St. John for burial in the new Catholic cemetery and it is expected that the funeral will take place on Friday. Much sympathy will be extended to Mr. and Mrs. Sugrue in the death of their only son just on the threshold of manhood.

### Albert H. Upham.

Hampton, March 26.—(Special).—The many friends here of Albert H. Upham regretted to hear of his death which took place on Friday at his home in Providence, R. I. Mr. Upham is survived by his wife who was before his marriage Miss Anna Frost, of Lower

Norton; one son, Murray, and two sisters, Mrs. Tilus, of Apohagui, and Mrs. Morley, of Sussex, and one brother, Gilbert, of Lakeside. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon, interment being in Upham. Mr. Upham was born in Upham and several years ago moved to Providence where he had since resided. The past two summers he has spent in Hampton and has many friends here who extend their heart-felt sympathy to those so bereaved.

### Dennis O'Sullivan.

The death of Dennis O'Sullivan occurred at his residence yesterday. For many years he had been in the employ of the Canada Brush Co., and was well and favorably known among a large circle of friends. He is survived by his wife and six sons, Timothy, of Norfolk, Va.; Joseph, of the C.P.R. at Amherst; William C., of the C.N.R. here; and John, Harry and Dennis, all here; also one sister, Mrs. T. W. Kievenan, in the United States. The funeral will take place from Fitzpatrick's undertaking rooms on Friday morning at 7:15 to the Cathedral for high mass of requiem.

### The Late Mrs. James E. White.

Shediac, March 26.—(Special).—Flags at half-mast and a general sadness over the sea-side town prevails today, as a consequence of one of a much beloved citizen being laid to rest. The funeral took place at 9:30 o'clock this morning of the late Mrs. White, wife of Dr. James E. White, who passed away at her home, Main street, on Monday morning, following a long illness. A large body of citizens were in the funeral cortege, two vehicles containing the many beautiful floral offerings among which were wreaths from the Mayor and the Council, and from the Red Cross Society, in loving memory of one of its members. A solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. Father L'Archeveque of Shediac, deacon and Rev. Father Carville Ducon, of St. Joseph's, sub-deacon. The pall bearers were Mayor Kelly, Messrs. J. V. Bouquet, F. J. Robidoux, ex-M. P., A. J. Tait, E. Paturo and Geo. Legere.

The sympathy of the whole community goes out to the family connection. The town deeply feels the loss of Mrs. White, who took an active part in its citizenship, its church life and its service for the "up-lift" of the people. She was prominent in social circles. The late Mrs. White was a native of Moncton, a daughter of J. M. Lyons, but had spent the greater part of her life in Shediac.

### Mrs. W. T. Herridge.

The death occurred at Ottawa on Saturday of Mrs. Herridge, wife of the Rev. Dr. W. T. Herridge, pastor of the St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, of Ottawa. She was the eldest sister of Rev. Dr. George Duncan, of Montreal, and has a married daughter living in Westmount. Mrs. Herridge was the daughter of the late Rev. Thomas Duncan, D. D., of Charlottetown, P. E. I., Halifax and Bridge of Weir, Scotland, being born and educated in this country. She went to Scotland with her parents at a later date and came to Canada again to be married to Rev. W. T. Herridge in 1885, since which time she has resided at Ottawa.

Mrs. Herridge was president of the Patriotic Fund, of the Canadian Red Cross Society, Ottawa branch, of the local Canadian Club, and was an active worker in a nurses' association during the war. She was a frequent contributor of essays and special articles to magazines and reviews in her earlier years. Mrs. Herridge is survived by her husband, Rev. Dr. Herridge, former moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly; by a son, W. Duncan Herridge, Ottawa barrister, and two married daughters, Mrs. Kenneth McLachlin, of "The Hill," Amherst, and Mrs. Eric McLachlin, of Westmount. Another son, Gordon, who died last year, was married to a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Baillie, Westmount.

### Mrs. Charles Ellis.

He was also a member of the Knights of Pythias order. Besides his parents, he is survived by his wife and two little daughters, Ruth and Josephine. Mrs. Gorbell was formerly Miss Margaret Wallace, a daughter of J. J. Wallace, a former well known Monctonian, now a resident in Vancouver. A. P. Gorbell, assistant superintendent of transportation of the C. N. R. here, is a brother of the deceased. Mrs. H. B. Wheaton of Winnipeg, and Mrs. Dunham of Hollywood, California, are sisters.
