ed was sent into the shops, and the remainder liquid.

Immediate attention was given the lines of communication between the Far East and the West.

It is over this route that the Far East's greater part must be brought, as a result of the increase in tonnage available, but with the rapidly improving service the Siberian farmer is getting more service.

The wisdom of the ministry in selecting the railway repair shops as the initial place to start re-development has been seen in the rapid increase in the amount of available rolling stock. Figures for the first four months of 1919 show that in that time the repair production was increased from ninety-six cars per month in January to 841 in April. Since that time, it is stated, considerable expansion has taken place.

Under the guidance of the minister, L. A. Cistruffi, it is believed that the best of this year will see the Siberian railways twice as strong as they were in December, 1918. During the early stages of the work conditions for rehabilitation were most unsatisfactory.

Many instances the shops were located near the battle fronts. There was a tremendous shortage of raw materials (rod and rails) and skilled labor was almost impossible to get. Conditions are much improved now, however, as the growing strength of the Omsk Government takes its place.

The chief imports from America for the year have been rail materials and practically all of these have gone into the reconstruction of the Siberian railway system. In the Far East Japan is paying considerable attention to the development of transportation facilities in various sections, while England has been reported in recent official dispatches as being interested in the unloading facilities at the various ports.

With the rapidly developing commerce of eastern Siberia, transportation needs are considered one of the most imperative. The campaigns against the Bolsheviks have been fully restored it is felt that the downfall of the Bolshevik forces will be accomplished quickly. At the same time the freed territory is making considerable strides in the development of commerce.

Trying to Re-establish Communications—Downfall of Bolshevik Forces Believed to be Dependent Upon Transportation

New York, Oct. 16.—The work of re-building transportation lines put out of commission by the Bolsheviks in their early successes has been taken up by the Russian Minister of Transportation. Realizing that before any additional lines could be built it would be necessary to repair those destroyed by the Reds, the ministry set about the reconstruction without delay, according to the American Committee of Siberian Agricultural Unions, 250 Broadway.

The services of the best railroad men in Russia were secured as well as those of many foreign engineers. Hundreds of miles of track have to be replaced. Inspection showed that a large percentage of the rolling stock of the various Siberian railroads had been made unfit for use, considerable strides in the development of commerce.
