After graduating she followed her profession until February, 1917, when she enlisted as a Red Cross nurse and sailed for France. She was in Belgium for some time, serving at the

After the armistice she went to Germany with the American Army of Occupation and while serving as a nurse was stricken with meningitis. She rallied sufficiently to be brought to the United States and taken to Washington, where everything possible was done, but the complications which set in baffled the best medical skill and she passed away. West, of Centreville, a stepmother, one sister, Miss Frances West, superintendent of one of the departments of the Massachusetts General Hospital, and one brother, Charles F., of many with the American Army of Oc-
