### IMPROVEMENT OF STOCK.

**CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT.**  
OTTAWA, Oct. 1st, 1870.

**NOTICE** is hereby given that his Excellency  
the Governor General, by an order in Coun-  
cil, bearing date the 29th of September last, has  
been pleased to approve of the following Regu-  
lations governing the importation of Animals  
for the improvement of stock, under Sec. 4, of 33  
Victoria, Cap. 9.

**REGULATIONS.**  
1. In all cases a certificate of purity of blood  
given by the breeder of the animal, and accom-  
panied by a certificate of identification, signed and  
sworn to by the importer should be furnished to  
the Collector at the Port of entry.

2. In addition to the foregoing certificate, there  
shall be required in special cases, the further  
evidence hereinafter mentioned, viz:

**HORSES OR OTHER FEEDS.**  
3. Such horses having no Stud Book, an au-  
thenticated certificate of purity of blood and  
identification will be sufficient.

**SHORTHORN CATTLE.**  
4. The breeder's certificate should embody a  
correct pedigree, referring to the English or  
American Short Horn Book.

**HEREFORD CATTLE.**  
5. The pedigree should refer to the English  
Hereford herd book.

**DEVON CATTLE.**  
6. The pedigree should refer to the English or  
American Devon herd book.

**AYRSHIRE CATTLE.**  
7. The pedigree should refer to the English or  
American Ayrshire herd book.

**ANGUS CATTLE.**  
8. The pedigree should refer to the English or  
American Angus herd book.

**GALLOWAY CATTLE, OR**  
**ALDERNEY CATTLE.**  
9. A certificate of purity of blood and identifica-  
tion will be sufficient, as first hereinabove pre-  
scribed.

10. And an other breed or description of cattle  
which is not specifically named in the foregoing,  
shall be held to be included in the general descrip-  
tion embodied in the Regulation.

**SHEEP, PIGS, AND POULTRY.**  
11. In these cases a similar certificate and iden-  
tification will be required, as in the next preced-  
ing case.
