"The providing of Old Age Persions for our people is a matter that demands immediate attention and this it shall receive at ou hands." The above extract is tal en from the paragraph in Sir Edward Morris' Manifesto of 1908, in which he promised that his party, if returned to power, would devise a scheme of Old Age Pensions "within the means of the Colony and not requiring additional taxation." This promise has been carried out to the letter. In less than two years from date of assuming office he introduced and passed into law an Old Age Pension received their cheques for the first needy and deserving old man in the country, entitled to a pension under the terms of the measure.


