Inhabited by Cannibals, Where Human

Sacrifices Were Cusiomary.

LONDON, June 16—Details of the expedition lately concluded by the southern Nigerian government, by which some 5000 square filles of hitherto unknown and madministered country in the north and on the borders of Northern Nigeria have been brought under effective control, have been received by Reuter's Agency.

These operations, which were carried out among tribes who for the most part had never previously seen a white man, proved entirely successful, and were so managed that there was practically no serious fighting. They began early in November last, and only concluded in the middle of April.

The British force consisted of 700 men of the southern Nigeria regiment, under the command of Colonel Trensistations.

RAILWAY TRAVEL IN SCHOOLS

German Pupils Now Being Taught Novelty in Education.

On his desk he had written his farewell message in the detested Latin, a parody of the gladiator's greeting on entering the arena: "Hall, friends. He who is about to die, salutes you."
