

MEXICO. Is a Good Market for Products of Canada.

Sir William Mulock is Greatly Impressed With Mexico and the Field It Offers for Trade With the Dominion of Canada.

OTTAWA, March 5.—Sir William Mulock, who has just returned to Ottawa after several weeks passed along with his wife and other members of his family in Mexico, was seen by the Herald correspondent.

"Instead of being afflicted as formerly," said Sir William, "by revolutionary disturbances, the country has under President Diaz, enjoyed unbroken domestic peace, thereby enabling the people to devote their whole energies to industrial development.

"The native population is Aztec, an Indian race, but there has been a very considerable admixture of Spanish blood since the days of Cortez, from which come the Mexicans of today.

"The City of Mexico itself is one of the best policed cities in the world, and is becoming a favorite winter resort of American tourists, and is rapidly being improved by the construction of sewers, pavements, and other municipal works, that promise to make it, if it is not now, one of the most attractive cities in America.

"While the republic possesses great agricultural resources, agriculture itself is being carried on in a somewhat primitive manner, and is rapidly being improved by the construction of canals, and other works, that promise to make it, if it is not now, one of the most attractive cities in America.

"The Mexican government is spending large sums of money in public works in the Gulf of Mexico and on the Pacific, investing millions of dollars in improving the railway lines, and also, I understand, added very largely to the Tehuantepec Railway, which crosses Mexico from the Gulf of Mexico to the Pacific.

"The houses occupied by the natives throughout the farming districts are, as a rule, primitive and wretched looking structures, some of baked clay called adobe, others of one thatched with dried native grasses.
