The Presbytery was constituted with Sow the seed in a shallow box in light soil as soon as possible; cover lightly with firm soil and keep quite moist and out of the direct sunlight. A pane of glass over the box assists in keeping an even moisture; this should be removed, however, as soon as the plants appear. Transplant into three inch pots or into boxes as soon as large enough to handle, from whence they can go into the ground as soon as well rooted.
