"The Centennial Memorial Hall," the eastern wing of which is called "The Black Memorial Chapel," in honor of the Rev. William Black, the founder of Methodism in the Maritime Provinces, was formally opened with appropriate ceremonies in October last. The building has been found well adapted to the purposes for which it was erected, and has added greatly to the comfort of Professors and Students.

The building is of red sandstone, with basement courses, coigns, and arches of light olive freestone. It is 95 feet in length by 50 feet in width, and two stories high above the basement. The central tower is 70 feet high. The windows of the Library and Chapel are of stained glass, among which are two beautiful and costly Memorial Windows, one to the memory of Hon. Charles F. Allison, the founder of the Institutions, provided at the expense of the late Mrs. Charles F. Allison; the other, to the memory of the Rev. William Black, given by his grandson, Martin P. Black, Esq., of Halifax.
