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MOTOR VEHICLE FEES IN N. B. INCREASED

Extensive upward revision in Schedule Announced by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works.—Retrospective to January 31, 1932.

Fredericton.—Important and extensive changes in Motor Vehicle Fees in New Brunswick have been passed by order-in-council and announced by Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works.
 The main changes, which are retroactive to January 31, 1932, may be summarized as follows:
 Operator's License, formerly \$1.00 is now \$2.00.
 Passenger cars formerly 95c per hundred weight, are now charged 90c.
 Registration of motor cycle, formerly \$3.00 for first registration and \$1.00 for annual registration.
 Trailers, formerly 40c per hundred pounds carrying capacity, will be 90c per hundred pounds, with a minimum charge of \$5.00, under 2½ cent regulations.
 Motor buses, freight or passenger and commercial trucks are generally scheduled with an increase of 25c to 50c per hundred weight.
 A new class of motor vehicle has been made by the Department in the new regulations, to be known as a Service Crane, for which a flat rate of \$25.00 is to be charged.

SAFETY RECORD

IN FRASER MILLS, MADAWASKA, ME.

The Employees of Fraser Paper Limited at Madawaska, Me., have made a new record in their Accident Prevention Campaign.
 The Board, Board and Catalogue Mills operated during October, November, December, (1931) January and February (1932) without a single lost of time accident, and to date this record is still unbroken.
 The date of the last lost of time accident was September 24th, 1931.
 The Catalogue Mill has operated since November 15th, 1930, without any lost of time from accidents, and many departments have operated for over a year without lost time accidents.
 These mills are in the National Safety Contest for 1931-1932, and are making a strong effort to win national honors in this contest.

Chowders are never strained, but should be full of succulent, appetizing tidbits. Serve poured over a cracker, or a real pilot biscuit in a man-sized soup bowl. It's a cold weather favorite whenever served.

Life Underwriters Protest Against Such Proposals

Superintendent of Insurance and Tax Increase
 A meeting of the Life Underwriters Association of Edmundston was held on the evening of March 14th for the purpose of protesting to the Provincial Government against the proposed increased tax on Life Insurance premiums and the appointment of a certain individual as Superintendent of Insurance for New Brunswick, who is unqualified for the position. Resolutions of protest against these proposals were adopted and copies forwarded to the Premier of the Province, the Provincial Secretary, the local Member for Madawaska County and the Provincial Vice-President of the Life Underwriters Association of Canada, Montreal, N. B. Similar resolutions of protest have also been adopted by all local Underwriters Association in the Province.
