"PUSSYFOOT" HAD GREAT TIME IN SAHARA DESERT

Did Not Find it Dry as Represented—Enjoyed His Visit Very Much.

Johnson, the American prohibition advocate whom London loves to call "Pussyfoot" was in Northern Africa recently, whether he went to recuperate after his "ragging" by London students, he didn't find the Sahara as dry as dry as symbolically represented.

"Do they drink in the desert?" we asked Pussyfoot. "They do; chiefly vermouth," he replied. "But then it isn't easy to drink in that hot country—stimulants there are much more than they ever could be in a temperate climate like England—and they do enough harm here."

"The natives call anything that is mixed a 'cocktail.' They are not really supposed to drink under the law of the Koran. But, as they say, the Koran forbids them drinking 'wine'—and not whiskey or gin. And so, there you are!"

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Chatting about his experiences Mr. Johnson said: "I have returned in excellent shape. The Sahara is indeed some place. I saw lots of sights and lots of fights. There was one great scarp between two drunken Arabs, but it all ended in their kissing and making up."

"I didn't go there to preach 'Pussyfoot' to the Arabs and Sudanese and all the others. Indeed, not. I went for a holiday and I collected some queer things, too."

"Carthage has always interested me, and I had a talk with the White Friars. I bought a priceless piece of work, a Punic wine jar they had excavated from the ruins of the place. It's as good as new."

"It's not going to be used for its original purpose, though."

"Mr. Johnson brought back a wonderful yellow gown."

"I bought it because I want it made up into a nightgown," he whispered. "It will make a beautiful silk nightgown. In fact, I bought several others but this one was a particular prize, for it took me five hours to get it."

"I happened to see an Arab with it, and I coveted it. So I asked a Bedouin who could talk French, and discovered that the Arab wanted ten dollars for it. I offered him eight, no,



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
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
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
