EVEN THE "GLOBE" FINDS NO FAULT.

When the Toronto Globe fails to find fault with an administrative action of the Dominion Government, it must be because the Globe can't find any fault.

Not here we find the Globe's opinion not only failing to criticize the application of the Agricultural Grants to the province but actually approving it.

This from the Globe of June 10th: "So much time has been lost by the Dominion Department of Agriculture in adopting a detailed plan for the distribution of the recently enacted grant of ten million dollars for aiding agriculture in the Provinces of Canada. The amount to be distributed this year is half a million dollars, and the Ontario is to receive \$125,000, population being the basis of distribution. This is not to be used for the purpose of resending the agricultural grant ordinarily made as Provincial legislation, but is to be spent on services selected or suggested by the Dominion Department of Agriculture. In order to secure the carrying out of this arrangement in good faith, while half of the Provincial grant to be paid over at once, the other half will be retained by the Ottawa authorities until they have found the assurance that it is fairly earned."

It is to be hoped that the half million dollars granted for this year, and also the similar grants for some years to come, will always be usefully applied to such much needed improvements in the various Provinces. Agriculture is in every Province, and in the whole Dominion, the most important industry. It comes closest home to the domestic life of people everywhere, and offers better opportunities than any other calling to co-operate work among the members of a family, and among groups of families in a locality.

There are parts of the Dominion which far too large a portion of the food of the people is still imported in spite of the fact that soil and climate are both favorable to agriculture.

The cost of living is very high and the most effective way to reduce it is to improve agricultural methods and inspire agricultural enthusiasm.

Ontario's share of the half million grant is to be spent mainly on educational work, and this is as it should be. The list of services prescribed by the Dominion Department includes appropriations for the erection and improvement of buildings, for improving breeds of live stock, for promoting the educational work of agriculture in connection with public schools and for assisting agricultural associations, exhibitions and institutes. Under the ultimate direction, if not supervision and instruction of so experienced an administrator and organizer as Mr. C. C. James, the contemplated series of grants should, by stimulating provincial enterprise, have a very perceptible effect on agricultural conditions.

FLOOD PREVENTION AND RIVER REGULATION.

Floods, like many other natural phenomena, may not be preventable, but they can be in large measure controlled. This has been demonstrated in many of the countries of Western Europe. For many years, the governments of France, Germany, Austria and Switzerland have had competent engineers supervising the improvement of their river systems. In fact, so important has this work become that it is recognized as a well established branch of engineering. It was early realized that such work cannot safely be left to riparian owners, whether they are individuals or municipalities. Consequently, the governments assumed control and carried out the work on a comprehensive basis.

European engineers usually provide a fixed and suitable channel for the ordinary flow of the rivers, as well as a definite channel to take care of extreme floods. Permanent bridges, harbours, locks and roads are built so as to meet flood conditions. Obstruction of the river beds, or of the flood plains in any way that would injure the general welfare, is forbidden.

In Canada and the United States, on the other hand, no comprehensive plan of flood prevention has, as yet, been evolved. That the problem is becoming urgent was shown by the recent disastrous floods in different parts of the United States. For a century or more the physical conditions along Canadian rivers have been steadily changing. Forests have been cleared, swamps drained, and land turned into farms. The result has been that, for a few days in the spring of each year, many of the rivers become raging torrents, and, for the rest of the year, are comparatively insignificant streams. More or less spasmodic local efforts have been made in certain instances, to cope with this situation. These efforts have been inadequate, however, and, in some cases, have caused further serious injury to other riparian owners.

What is needed are provincial and Federal systems of river regulation under the direction of competent engineers.

The latter should be given authority to prevent encroachment upon river channels and they should be required to make a careful preliminary study of the river systems so as to ascertain with some degree of accuracy the proper methods of preventing, or at least, of regulating floods.

BY THE WAY.
