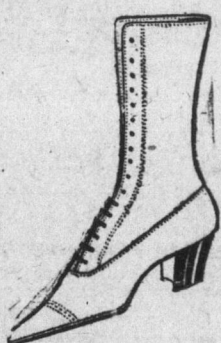

Fast Airplanes Are Being Planned

GEN. SEELEY TELLS OF ENTIRELY NOVEL KIND OF AIR CRAFT NOW UNDER CONSIDERATION

London March 13.—During the war 8,000 enemy airplanes were shot down by the British air forces while 2800 British machines were missing. Gen. J.E.B. Seeley announced in the Commons to day in introducing the army's air estimates of 66,500,000 pounds. Gen. Seeley said that if the war had continued the estimate would have been 200,000,000 pounds.

When the armistice was signed, he added, England was turning out 4,000 airplanes a month and had 200 squadrons in commission compared to six at the beginning of the war.

Gen. Seeley said it was intended to keep 102 squadrons for defense, but that the country would not rely so much on the number of machines as in remaining in the forefront of aerial development.

Air forces, he added would be maintained in Egypt, Mesopotamia, Archangel and the Near and Middle East.

Facilitate Work. He pointed out the political officers at Bagdad would be able by airplane to carry in two days the same number of inspections in order to secure continuous friendly relations with the inhabitants as would previously have taken two months. Gen. Seeley said that a large part of the estimate would be available for the encouragement of civilian aviation.

The first duty of the new civilian branch of the air ministry, Gen. Seeley continued, would be to secure an international agreement in Paris, with regard to the future of flying which must always in many respects be an international business because there are no natural boundaries.

Dilatant on the enormous scientific development in aviation including the discovery of the wireless telephone by which aviators are able both to send and to receive from the same operator, Gen. Seeley mentioned an entirely novel type of air craft which is under consideration, and which he said mathematicians claimed could attain hitherto unheard of speed.

Winnipeg, March 14.—This afternoon at 4:45 the Selkirk team champions of the Manitoba Senior Hockey League will leave for Toronto, where they will meet the Hamilton Tigers winners of the O.H.L. senior championship in the playoff for the Allan Cup. Besides the Selkirk team and its supporters there will be a party of fifteen from the Regina Patricias, going after the junior title making a party of about fifty.

DATES ARE ARRANGED FOR UNITED STATES GOLF TITLES
New York March 13.—The Executive of the United States Golf Association has selected the week beginning August 18 in which to hold the national amateur gold championship at the Oakmont Country Club, Allegheny county, Pennsylvania. The women's national title tournament will take place during the week beginning September 29 at Shawnee-on-Deleware, Pennsylvania, over the links of the Shawnee Country Club.
