Of Norman descent. B. in the Island of Jersey. Ed. in Jersey, and at Caen in Normandy. A Jane, dau. of Hon. J. G. Marshall, formerly Chief Justice of Cape Breton. Is Vice Consul for France at Sydney, and Lieut.-Col. Cape Breton Reserve Militia. Sat for Cape Breton in N.S. Assembly, from 1859 until the Union. Called to the Senate by Royal Proclamation, May, 1867. A Conservative.—*Sydney, C.B.*

BEAU, Hon. JACQUES OLIVIER, N.P.

Family originally came from Normandy to Quebec, and subsequently removed to Montreal. Sat Three Rivers, Q. M., 1868, Madame J. H. Larroux. A Notary Public. Sat for Napierville in Can. Assembly from g. e. 1854 until Sept., 1862, when elected for De Lorimier Division in C., which he represented until the Union. Was a mem. of Ex. Council, and Provincial
