

The board has approved a double-edged recommendation by the coroner calling for the provincial government to raise the drinking age to 21 and to ban all ads promoting sale of alcohol.

Exactly one year ago, the board sent a letter to Premier Davis asking that the drinking age be raised to 20, primarily to put drinking beyond the legal

We're always told that case, let's raise the voting and fighting age to 21 as well, said Trustee well, said Tr Margaret Marland.

"I don't think 18-yearolds are in the position to make decisions for themselves, their province or their nation," she added.

Brampton Trustee Archie Gould described he issue as a 'motherhood issue' and said raising the age wouldn't make any difference.

"Regardless of what the age is, it won't make one iota of difference, except it

ing the law. A lot of kids can get alcohol now at 16 or get a friend to get it for them," Gould said.

Trustee Tony Aston also said it was a "motherhood issue," adding he thought it was difficult for parents to tell their children to do something "when they insist on doing it
