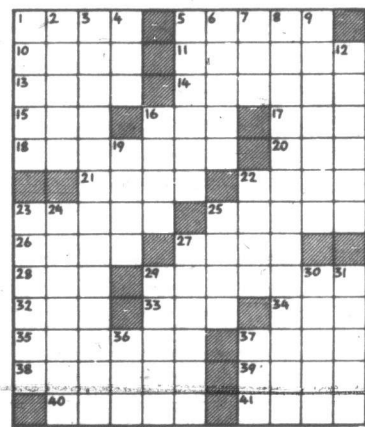

### Plugged into the Mississauga Library

The Malton Centennial Branch of the Mississauga Public Library (3500 Morningstar Dr.) is in the midst of their summer program for school age children. The program will include crafts and films and takes place Thursday mornings at 10:30 through to the end of August.

The Burnhamthorpe Branch (1350 Burnhamthorpe Rd. E.) in co-operation with the Department of Parks and Recreation presents Indian Summer, a program for children of all ages at 1:30 p.m. on August 1, 2 and 3.

The Audio Visual Department of the Mississauga Public Library announces the addition of the new film Bill Cosby on Prejudice. On a supposedly live TV talk show our "man in the street" Bill Cosby discusses with solemn conviction his method of making the world a better place.

He lists those people he believes must be "pushed aside, with no bloodshed or anything, just put away somewhere." The list includes old people, kids, Jews, Blacks, Italians, Mexicans, Japanese, Southerners, Northerners, in short, just about everyone but himself.

Written and produced by Bill Cosby this short, low-key film is a humorous but penetrating exposure of prejudice and bigotry. It may be reserved by phoning the Audio Visual Department at 279-7002.

On Sunday, July 9 the library staff pitched in to carry the entire adult, youth and reference departments one flight up and one building over to the extension built just behind the existing building at 110 Dundas St. W. There were thousands of books to be shifted, but

except for a few stiff backs and aching joints the move was accomplished with relatively little pain. We are now settling in to our carpeted and spacious new quarters.

The space in the old building will fast be taken up by the expanding Children's Department, the Technical Services Department and a proposed new auditorium.

There is an elevator located in the rear of the foyer of the new building for your convenience. Although the workmen are still completing the finishing touches and the parking lot is not yet in working order, we expect the library to be in first class shape for September's official opening.

So come in to browse or borrow and while you're in check for some of these new books: How to Talk to Birds and other uncommon ways of enjoying nature the year round by Richard Davids; The Wind from the Sun: stories from the space age by A.C. Clarke author of 2001 Space Odyssey; In the Name of Profit: profiles in corporate irresponsibility by R.L. Heilbroner; Is It the Sun, Phillip? the latest novel by French Canadian Roch Carrier author of La Guerre, Yes Sir! and Floralie, Where Are You?; Masterpieces of Fifty Centuries: the Metropolitan Museum of Art with an introduction by Civilization's Sir Kenneth Clark; James Beard's American Cookery; for cool reading in the summer months plan ahead with Modern ABC's of Ice Fishing by J. Chiappetta; Power Politics is Canadian Margaret Atwood's latest collection of verse and contains many poems which can only be described as barbed so easily do they penetrate the skin and take firm hold there.
