

St. Josephs, has not only produced many difficulties, and great irregularities, but has unfortunately been prejudicial to the Kings Indian Interest, which has been strongly pointed out by the Deputy Superintendent General, in his Report to me last Year. - Should you Sir, therefore be of opinion, that W. The Office of Store keeper, and that of Interpreter at St. Josephs are united in the same person, should they be separated, I apprehend that the Officer who is now executing the duties of those situations would resign, as the Office of Store keeper alone would not prove a sufficient compensation for his Labour. - Your Excellencies information, that the Interpreter of St. Josephs is not well qualified as such, does not agree with the Recommendation of
