of the largest bands in the Agency. They are all Swampy Crees and number 406, which, compared with last year shows an increase of 10. I paid treaty on the following day, the 9th. This took me all day. This band was in good health. The doctor commemted very favorably on the medical dispenser's work. On the 10th I checked over all the supplies which I found had been stored in the Lac la Ronge Boarding School storehouse. I distributed the Twine, Ammunition, etc. among them, and gave them some provisions to divide among themselves. This occupied another day. On the 11th I held a meeting with Chief and Councillors. The 12th being Sunday I did not leave as I was also waiting for mail from Prince Albert. On Monday the 13th a formal complaint was laid against a woman by her hysband for insanity. We had no documents for this purpose but Const. Hassey typed out the necessary forms, and the case was brought up for hearing before me. After examining the husband and others and the woman, I felt justified in sending the woman out for treatment. When asked to give her reasons why she should not be sent out, she said "It is alright, I will stay at home and mind the children while my husband is away". If allowed to speak she would speak for a long time telling of people in the air who were communing with her. Her husband said she would sit for hours talking to no one but
