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Q. And so your father got the land on the west side and William got the land on the east side from Morriseau and then Morriseau went where?

A. He moved farther down on the west side just a few chains north of what he sold to my father.

Q. He moved farther down on the north side?

A. Yes.

Q. And he put up a house there?

A. Yes, and lived there for some time and my father bought him out again.

Q. And your father got a patent for that? A Yes.

Q. What year was that?

A. It was have been before the Treaty and the reason I say is he got three lots to get a patent for.

Q. Now where did Morriseau move from where he lived farther north.

A. He moved then down on the east side down to about 120.

Q. 120, and he was living there at the Transfer?

A. I expect so.

Q. Then listen if I am right. Joseph Morriseau was on 98 and a Monkman got that and then Joseph Morriseau claimed 148 and James Monkman is claiming that? A. Yes.

Q. And then he moved farther north and a Monkman got that, and then he moved on the east side and Muckle got that?

A. I don't know.

Q. Oh yes, you swore an affidavit as to that?

A. I don't know.

Q. You havent seen him?

A. No, I havent seen him.

Q. Did William use Lot 148 or 150 in any way before the Transfer?

A. Only by taking the wood off it.

Q. When he was in the Hudson's Bay service it seems that James said he took hay?

A. William never took hay off it.

Q. Then William never took hay off Lot 102?

A. No.
