

Dear Sir,—Members of the Ancient Order of United Workmen having called my attention to their new rates as to their bearing heavy on the aged members; I now give some figures from the Acturies Mortality Table, compiled from the experience of 17 British Life Offices and 4 per ent. interest.

Where a man became a member at the age of 45, twenty years ago, the cost of carrying the risk the first year was only \$11.74 per \$1,000 exclusive of expenses, where it is now worth \$42.39, and at this period it would require a reserve of \$495 to the credit of each \$1,000 insurance to counteract the increase of premims with the age of the insured

The net level premium at age 65 is \$74.42 per \$1,000, where at age 45 it is \$28.85, which would have done it as well as given a paid up policy of \$580 or a cash surrender value of
