WATERFORD.

On Sept. 15th, Mr. George Perry died very suddenly, at his residence, Kerry park terrace, Summerland, Waterford. Deceased was in his usual health the previous day. On the same day Mr. J. Lawrence, boot and shoe merchant, Broad street, Waterford, took suddenly ill, and died in a few minutes. Deceased had not been previously complaining.

Archbishop Trench has intimated to his tenants near Dungarvin, that he will allow an abatement of 35 per cent. off the half-year's rent due 29th September, to all tenants holding under written agreements, and that he will make a similar reduction in the half-year's rent falling due on the 29th March, 1880.

ANTRIM.

On September 19th an inquest was held at Belfast on the body of Alexander Leman, seaman on board the Rotterdam steamer Lord Byron, who met his death by falling down the hold of the steamer when putting on the hatch. The jury, after hearing the evidence, returned a verdict of accidental death, and recommended the widow of the deceased to the favorable consideration of the owners of the ship. The deceased was a native of Warrenpoint.

ARMAGH.

On Sunday, Sept. 14th, the new Church of the Sacred Heart, erected at Lisela, parish of Lower Kileavy, and county of Armagh, was solemnly dedicated to the worship of God. High Mass was celebrated at twelve o'clock, and His Grace the Most Rev. Dr. McGeenigan was the preacher. The sermon was an impressive one, and a collection was taken up in aid of the building fund.

Lurgan was again the scene of disgraceful party rowdiness, a Catholic young man named Savage, whose father was beaten to the verge of death in the late riot, was attacked in Edward street, and beaten. His assailants were stabbed him through the hand. This was the signal for the turn-out of a mob in Shankill street. The windows of a Protestant's dwelling in Shankill street were broken in with stones, and stones were thrown at the house of a man named Lunn in Edward street. The disturbance continued for two hours, and the police were forced in their endeavors to restore order. Four young men have been identified for the assault upon Savage, and five members of the stone-throwing mob, were arrested.

TYRONE.

The Royal Humane Society has awarded its medal to John Garraty for saving a lad named Colman who was in danger of drowning in the River Rhone, Redford, near Moy, county Tyrone, on the 27th of July.

GALWAY.

Mr. Michael Grealy, T. C., P. L. G., died in Galway, on Sept. 13th. Mr. Grealy has been ill for a considerable time, so that his death was not altogether unexpected. After High Mass at the Protestant hall, his remains were interred in the family burying place at the West Cemetery. Mr. Grealy was for years one of the most independent members of the Public Body.

MAYO.

A disastrous fire occurred at Ballycastle, on Sept. 11th, in the house of Michael Murphy, publican. About 1.30 a.m., the proprietor, the only occupant in the house at the time, discovered the fire on which he lay to be on fire, and on jumping out, found the whole premises enveloped in flames. His only means of escape was by jumping through a window into the street. All he could take along with him was his trousers and shirt. Had he not discovered the fire he would have perished in the flames, and the police were on the scene, and worked in a very creditable manner to extinguish the flames, but without avail, as the fire was too far advanced. The only thing that could be done was to cut off the communication between the other houses and the burning premises. This was done immediately. There was nothing saved out of Murphy's store, the place being gutted. The loss is fully covered by insurance in the Commercial Assurance Company.

ROSCOMMON.

The marriage of The O'Connor Don, M. P., with Miss O'Farrell, only daughter of the late John L. O'Farrell, Esq., D. L., of Granite Hall, Kingstown, was celebrated on September 16th, in the private chapel of the Archbishop of Dublin, at his residence in Kingstown. The wedding breakfast took place at Granite Hall, the residence of the bride's father. The O'Connor Don and his bride proceeded to Dublin, and left by the North Wall express train for Holyhead on route for the Continent.

NEWS FROM IRELAND.

DUBLIN.

On September 12, Gerald Byrne, aged 45, of 3 Lisburn street, Dublin, a painter, came home from work (he had been employed at Mr. Poland's, 43 Upper Sackville street) at seven o'clock in the evening. He retired to rest apparently in good health, but at one o'clock he awoke complaining of pains in his stomach, but was otherwise in good health. On the same day a man named Patrick John Murphy, aged 65, a gardener, died suddenly in the top back room of the house 61 James street, where he had been living with his wife for some days previously. His wife left the room to consult some friends as to the advisability of procuring medical aid, but when she returned he was dead.

WICKLOW.

James A. Wall, Esq., Q. C., of Knockrigg, County Wicklow, has reduced the rents of his tenants by 25 per cent. on the present half year.

WEXFORD.

On Sept. 16th, Edward R. O'Farrell, Esq., Coroner of the Southern Division of the county Wexford, held an inquest on the body of Mr. Thomas Laffan, who was found dead in his bed on the previous morning. The deceased was for some years a member of the Wexford Harbor Commissioners, and was a shareholder in a great many vessels. During the day nearly all the vessels in the harbor had their flags hoisted half-mast high, and all the shops along the quays had their windows closed, as a mark of respect for the deceased. Dr. Pierce, who made an examination of the body, deposed that death resulted from the stoppage of the heart's action.

KING'S COUNTY.

On Sept. 18th, at a place called Ballydolly, near Killeegan, a man named Michael Whelan was working a reaping machine when the support under his foot gave away, and he fell on one of the wheels. The cogs lacerated his legs in a fearful way, and one boot was dragged from his foot with strange to say, but with little injury to the limb. While striving to stop the horses, his right hand was caught in the portion of the machine where the blades were, and he was all but severed from the arm. The horses were stopped by some other workmen who came up, and the wound on the hand having been bound up, the injured man was conveyed to the King's County Infirmary, where he now lies in a precarious state.

WESTMEATH.

On Sept. 15th, an inquest was held in the Athlone Union, before T. Fetherstonehaugh, Esq.,
