HANK O'DAY
NEEDED REST
 Dean of Memphis Admits It's
 a Strain "Call 'Em" Day
 in and Out.

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., July
 11.—Henry O'Day, the dean of um-
 pires, feels forced to take a brief
 vacation in the midst of the season,
 and has hustled himself over to
 Clemens to get into perfect shape
 again for the strenuous weeks to fol-
 low. "I hope they'll let me stay till
 I've taken my full course," replied
 O'Day, "for I need the rest and the
 water."

Ordinarily O'Day has an aversion
 to reporters, because he has been
 misquoted so often, but he is willing
 to talk ball at any time if he does
 not get sight of pencil and paper.

"I've been in professional ball ever
 since I was seventeen. I was living
 in Chicago at that time, and was
 considered a good amateur player. Just
 then Spaulding was picking up a
 club composed of the best amateurs
 in the city, and I got into the game
 early.

The public thinks a player is young
 because he has just been recruited
 from one of the minor leagues, but
 many of these fellows are gray-head-
 ed before they have a chance to get
 into the "big show." And speaking
 of age, if a man takes care of himself
 he ought to be able to do his best
 work in the late thirties. We have
 several mighty good players in both
 big leagues who are nearly forty."
 "Does it take nerve for an umpire
 to make a decision with 30,000 people
 velling at him? No, it takes quick
 judgment. I make my decisions
 before I see the play, and am will-
 ing to let the grand stand know
 how I feel about it."

 the series. The Giants had just won
 the game apparently, but Fred Mer-

 tention by the runner who was out
 of the ball and instantly called with the

 day the Cubs won the championship.

ROOSEVELT ON
JAP SITUATION
 He Says United States Can-
 not Afford to Let Them
 Into Country.

TOKIO, July 11.—The Tai-Itei-
 Vo news agency says today that Viscount
 Kato Kaneko has received a letter
 from Theodore Roosevelt expressing
 the view that American public
 opinion will not permit the naturaliza-
 tion of Japanese in the United States
 and would lead to a similar claim on
 the part of the Chinese. Mr. Roose-
 velt, according to the news agency,
 promised to us his efforts in the so-
 lution of the California land owner-
 ship situation.

Viscount Kaneko is a graduate in
 law of Harvard University. He was
 the official representative of Japan
 in the United States during the Rus-
 so-Japanese war and delivered many
 addresses all over the country.

FREAKS OF LIGHTNING
AT CATHCART VILLAGE
 Two Persons Render Un-
 conscious—One Had Cloth-
 ing Torn From Him.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
 CATHCART, Ont., July 11.—Dur-
 ing a severe electrical storm which
 raged in this district Wednesday sev-
 eral accidents occurred. The son of
 Jerome Kinsella of this village, who
 was driving on a hayrack on the farm
 of Frank Dawes, one mile east of here
 was struck by lightning and rendered
 unconscious. He remained in that
 condition for about four hours, but
 was finally revived, and though con-
 fined to his bed, is now doing as well
 as can be expected. At the time
 the accident occurred an old man,
 named Messicar, was in the barn
 nearby and started to the assistance
 of young Kinsella. He was also
 struck, and his shirt and shoes torn
 from him. The shirt caught fire, but
 was easily extinguished. He was
 stunned but was not otherwise in-
 jured and soon recovered. The barn
 did not catch fire. The team attached
 to the hay rack which Kinsella was
 driving was struck by lightning, and
 Daves, the proprietor of the farm,
 was knocked down but was not seri-
 ously hurt.

It is rather a coincidence that Mr.
 James Kinsella, the father of the boy
 who was most seriously affected, was
 himself struck by lightning some two
 or three years ago in the vicinity of
 Paris.

During the same storm, a cow be-
 longing to Andrew Stephenson, who
 lives north of the village, was also
 struck and killed.
