BRITISH VESSELS SUNK

By Special Wire to the Courier. London, May 21.—An admiralty statement, giving the number of British merchant and fishing vessels sunk or captured since the beginning of the war, shows that 56 merchant ships have been sent to the bottom by cruisers of the enemy; 12 by mines, and 62 by submarines a total of 130. Eighty-three fishing craft have been lost, and of these 24 were sunk by mines. Since German submarines began their attack on merchant shipping January 18 the merchant vessels sunk by their number 59, and the fishing craft 31. Looking at these losses at the standpoint of tonnage it is seen that since the war began Great Britain has lost 453,006 tons in merchant shipping, and 13,585 tons in fishing craft.

SEVENTH SUNK

TO-DAY'S MILITARY MAIL FROM THE EUROPEAN WAR

From the Field Post Office to Brantford Postmaster "Billy" Bell indites the subjoined breezy epistle. He has had luck so far, he felt the bristles of the gas that pierced the line and drifting along, caused even the rear trenches to feel uncomfortable. He is with the 1st Brigade C. F. A. Headquarters staff.

I am writing to you in the Field Post Office. Oh! it is hot, not only the weather, but the battle. This war is hell, and although I have had some narrow escapes am whole. Brantford has got hit hard but they were the brave fellows. It was awful to see them coming back wounded. The boys in the 4th Battalion say I am lucky being with the artillery, as the artillery do not lose as many shells, but they get badly wounded, and being with the mail, I am back from the firing line. I am getting along fine. Have had rather an exciting time going to the trenches every morning and taking mail and delivering it. Then going to the Field post office to sort mail, and travelling a lot over the country, but don't forget to look out for Billy Bell. I have a good horse and sometimes get a long way and then get no mail. I have seen lots of the country. It looked a shame to see how many homes are blown to pieces, just piles of brick and mortar.

You would have laughed to have seen us in our dugouts. Just like rabbits. Dig a hole and put a few boards across and cover it up with earth. It is alright except when it rains. It is rather unpleasant. Once when it was raining I got wet in the dugouts but the weather is warm, so didn't get cold. Don't worry about me getting tobacco. I got tobacco from the Bat night, take mail and deliver it. Then going to the Field post office to sort mail, and travelling a lot over the country, but don't forget to look out for Billy Bell. I have a good horse and sometimes get a long way and then get no mail. I have seen lots of the country. It looked a shame to see how many homes are blown to pieces, just piles of brick and mortar.

I am going away for a rest after eighteen days in action, and it is about time I am getting fed up with war. It is awful hard on a person's nerves. Although I am away back from the firing line, I get enough of the poisonous gases to make tears come to my eyes and make them smart. Catch them, heads I found at Ypres. I saw Steve Cara and all the boys on the transport were alright, but they had it awfully hot sometimes. Just got your welcome letters dated April 9th, 10th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st. Canadian Contingent.

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The following letter is from Staff Sgt. J. J. Scanlon, now at the C.F. Headquarters on the battlefields of France. He says that the heroism of the 4th and "G" company was beyond all praise. Indeed, he avers, there were many individual feats of heroism that will never be recognized, it would seem, however, that they may be from the tenor of letters he has written where it has been mentioned that several lads have qualified for distinguished orders. Many of the lads assisted fallen comrades to shelter from exposed positions, and we had to take all the shells and Johnsons that came our way. It is very trying to the nerves, and I would much rather be right at the front where one expects to get hit. You can also try back a little (and a bit more) of what the enemy gives you. They are getting it now, and as time goes on they will get more than they bargained for. There were several marvellous feats of individual heroism performed by lads of the 4th and "G" companies. The majority of the officers having been killed or wounded they will never be officially reported. More than one boy helped a wounded comrade back to safety and proceeded again to his place as though nothing had happened. Poor Bill Lofty has gone, and many another old pal, and Ernie Prior and Bert West and Jaque Orr have been badly wounded, but I pray to God they will help finish off these murderers of non-combatants and women and children.

Give my best respects to all old friends in Brantford. I am looking forward to the time when we shall return to the city on the Grand. If you get a chance send me an Expositor or a Courier, will you? Regards to Art Cole. I hope his leg is better. Tell him Bert Davis is O.K. My blow to the city on the Grand, but lost his hit and wears a cap, but is still smiling.
