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WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any maison over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine

three years arter earning montescate preent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Preemption patent may be obtained as soon
as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per
acre. Duties—Must reside six months in
each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and
erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or steny
