SUCCESSIONAL CROPS

Many amateur gardeners are puzzled to know just how to handle a succession of crops. To get the most out of a small area it is necessary to plant seeds from week to week and, in some cases, to sow two crops in one row at one time. time. For instance, lettuce and radish may be sown in the same row, parships and lettuce, corn and pumpl corn and spinach, le and early cabbage, etc.

Some examples of cro-cessional plantings may serve to explain what is meant by following one crop with another: Early beets followed with

celery. Early beans followed with turnips.
Lettuce or onion sets followed with tomatoes.
Radishes followed with tomatoes.
Spinach, lettuce or radishes followed with cab-

shes followed with cab-bage.

Early crops may be tak-en off and consumed and immediately afterwards their place may be taken by some other crop. The soil should be dug over and manure added if possible. This should be followed by a careful raking down be-fore the plants are set out or the seeds planted.

Two British Sailors Start Trouble in Halifax— \$5,000 Damage Halifax, N.S., May 27 .- Mob rule

prevailed in the downtown section of this city Saturday night, when a crowd of soldiers, sailors and civil-ians attacked the city hall and caused damage estimated at \$5,000. The police court was wrecked, most of the windows in the building were smashed, the office of the City Engineer was damaged by chemicals used to extinguish an incipient blaze started by the pictors the city extra ed by the rioters, the city patrol wagon was thrown into the harbor, and an automobile and a motorcycle were taken from the wagon shed and padly battered. So far as is known, no one was

seriously hurt in the melee. The trouble started about 8 o'clock in the evening, when two British sailors were arrested by Policeman Isnor in F. W. Woolworth's five and ten cent store on Barrington street for refusing to pay for a purchased cake of soap. One of the sailors was taken to the police station at the city hall, but the other escaped, and evidently enlisted the sympathy of a number of soldiers and bluejackets for the police were notified about minutes later that a large crowd had collected at a street corner a few
