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CASES NOW BEING TRIED

Alleged Gamblers Are in Court Today

Considerable Quibbling Between Opposing Attorneys on Law Points.

In the presence of a very large crowd the trial of the gambling cases was opened at two o'clock this afternoon, the case of John W. Marshbank on the charge of "keeping a common gaming house," being by agreement between counsel the first called. Mr. de Lion was the first witness called. He declined the oath and was permitted to make affirmation.

Sergeant Smith was then called and Crown Prosecutor Congdon proceeded to question him as to his official position as chief of police of the city of Dawson. Witness then testified that Mr. Macaulay was police magistrate and that Inspector Starnes was acting in his stead.

Mr. Hagel, for the defence, interposed an objection. The questions were leading to the search warrant and he submitted that it was an invalid warrant and gave no authority. "We submit that your worship who signed it had no authority to sign it under the statutes. Section 575 provides that the chief constable or deputy chief constable, or other officer authorized to act in his absence, shall report in writing to the commissioner of police, or mayor, or police magistrate of such city, that there are good grounds for believing such a place is a gambling place."

Sergeant Smith was permitted to continue his testimony and said the search warrant was handed to him on the 8th, and he proceeded to execute it, at midnight on the 12th. He and three officers went to the Monte Carlo clubrooms and someone looked at him through a peephole in the door. Then he heard what sounded like a key turning in a lock. He tried the door and finding it locked put his shoulder against it and broke it open.

Mr. Hagel in cross-examination asked what proportion of the money turned in had been taken from the person of any person there, and if the sums named were all the money taken from the Monte Carlo; also if the lock was not a Yale lock that slipped of itself.

Thus far the hearing had progressed at 3:45, and it did not seem likely that this one case of Marshbanks would be concluded today.

Charge of Horse Stealing

Charles Johnson was in the dock at the police court this morning, charged with stealing a brown horse weighing about 1000 pounds and valued at \$200, the property of Alex Macdonald. The horse was missed from the stable by Mr. Sullivan, who went in search of it. He found the animal standing by a sidewalk in South Dawson, and the defendant said he owned it and produced a paper which he said was a bill of sale. A warrant was then issued for his arrest.

Mr. Hagel for the defence put in evidence a bill of sale for the animal, signed by one Frank Russell, the consideration being \$100. The principal witness was Julius Gocker, who had just stepped from the dock on a charge of throwing a spittoon at a man and cutting his face. He drew up this bill of sale. In fact he testified that he had drawn up two. He did not know Russell, neither did any of the other witnesses.

POLICE COURT.

When the case of L. Gingsberg, for perjury, was called in police court this morning Mr. McCaul appeared for the accused, and asked for a further adjournment, which was granted to Friday morning.

John Dwyer, a steamboat man who thought it convenient to sleep on First avenue within sound of the boat's whistle, was fined \$2 and costs.

W. J. White thought the boards of the Third avenue sidewalk soft enough to sleep on. A policeman persuaded him to the contrary and took him home. But in order to obtain more of the slumber brand he broke the window and got out. This is what might be termed an aggravated drunk and Inspector Starnes fined him \$5 and costs. He also indicated that in the future previous convictions would be called for and higher penalties awarded in accordance therewith.

VERY BAD DRAINAGE

Irregular Grades is Cause of Trouble

Hot Water From Laundry Houses and Restaurants Havoc With Ditches

The system of drainage in Dawson is something that needs a remedy. Some of the ditches appear to be stagnant, and after the melting of the snow the spring has disappeared. There are a score of lots in the city that contain pools of water and mosquitoes. Much of the water originates from the ditches but is put in at different places and is not uniform.

Then, too, the character of the water is such that when it rains it cuts very rapidly and is being often destroyed by the labor of the streets which are not provided with open storm drains. That is a matter for the city to wrestle with.

Last night City Engineer submitted to the council a report on the drainage question quite comprehensive. I discussed to Alderman William of the committee streets and property, as follows:

"I herewith submit for consideration the following report on the present drainage system of Dawson. I have very carefully examined the matter and find the cause of the poor drainage to be the irregular grades of the streets. The present system of drainage is not only dangerous to health but also a considerable damage to the water cut.
