The shortage of labour and the scargity and high prices of tin cans has
very materially reduced the coutput

some lines almost prohibited to the
average family.

There is little reason, however, for
any Canadian family not providing a
sufficient supply for next wniter. Home
canning of vegetables is a simpe matter; when put up in ordinary glassjars, securely sealed, they are equal
if, not superior to the factory brand,
the cost is much lower.

Peas, string beans, sweet corn, pumpkins, beets, tomatoes and all vestables
which will not keep without sookings,
may be canned.

After cleaning and preparing the
vegetables to be preserved, they are
enclosed in a cheesceloth bag parboiled for five minutes. They are then
dipped in cold water, packed in glass
jars, boiling water poured over them
to fill up all crevices, and the lids
Jossely adjusted. The jars are fine

PROTECTION OF CROPS

Crop protection means crop production. Canada loses over one hundred million dollars worth of her staple crops every year through the depredation of insect pests. A large portion of this loss could be prevented. As we cannot afford to lose the smallest portion of our grain and other food crops during the present critical period when the production of food is of supreme importance the Dominion Department of Agriculture is making every effort to prevent, so far as possible losses due to insect pests. Crop production.

Insect pests are not usually noticed or reported until they have caused considerable damage. Therefore it is urged that the closest watch be kept on all crops for the first appearance of any insect pests or damage. Immediately such damage is observed steps should be taken to control the outbreak in its inciplent stage. If the pest or the method of control is maknown specimens of the insect and its injuries should be sent at once to the nearest of the following sources of expert as-

or the method of control is unknown specimens of the insest and its injusies should be sent at once to the nearest of the following sources of expert assistance: The Agricultural Colleges, the Provincial Departments of Agriculture or their local District Represtatives, the officer in charge of the nearest Dominion Entomological Station, or direct to the Dominion Entomalogist, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, for examination; and advice in regard to control measures will be farnished without delay. Letters and packages up to 1 ounce, in weight may be mailed to the Dominion Entomologist, "Free," but postage will be required on letters or speciments sent to the other sources mentioned.
