Hespeler, Feb. 2).-In a letter jus received from Private Dalgelish, of this town, who is serving with the first contingent in South Africa, occur the following paragraphs:-

"One man from E. Company went down to the hospital to-day for the purpose of having his arm amputated. He fell over a feace and pricked his arm on a thistle, which later caused blood reigning, and the operation was blood poisoning, and the operation was necessary to save his life. # SHE FELT NO PAIN

An Aged Chicag, Woman's Leg Amputated by a New Method.

Woman of 83 Years Watched the Surgeon, but hat no Freing in Her Lower L mbs.

Chicago, Feb. 20.-Mrs. Mary Arndt, in spite of her 83 years, watched a surgeon at the county hospital yesterday amputate her right leg near the hip without any evidence of pain. The operation proved successful. The method by which it was performed was of great interest to surgeons and is said in professional circles a great step in that line of surgery in Amer-

Dr. Samuel L. Weber, a member of the advisory staff of the hospital, had charge of the operation, which is said to be the first of its nature performed in America and the second known to medical men, the first having been referred in Europe. Dr. Weber performed in Europe. Dr. Weber made a study of the initial operation and concluded that the method might be employed for the amoutation of lower limbs of patients who were unlower lambs of patients who were drable to withstand the effects of anesthetics. The method consists in the deadening of the nerves of the limbs by the injection of cocaine in the vertebral cavity above the point where tebral cavity above the point where nerves controlling the lower limbs branch from the spinal cord. The patient had suffered a gangre-nous affection of the deg and amouta-

nous affection of the leg and apputa-tion, became necessary to save her. She was not in a condition to make the use of an anesthetic safe, and the surgeons decided to try the method which had proved successful in a Ber-

lin hospital.

The drug was injected into the ent's vertebral cavity a short disince below the waist fine, and soon he announced that she had lost all feeling in her lower limbs, while she was fully conscious of what was going on, and had the full use of all her

The limb was removed two inches below the hip, and after the effect of the drug had passed away, the woman said she feit well. The prospects for her recovery are good.

# SURPRISED THEM.

People in Jacobsdal Expected to be Plundered by the British

And were Greatly Pleased to Find all

Their Property Respected. Hacobsdal, Saturday, Feb. 20.

Lord Roberts' troops Thursday entered this town, which has been in possession of the British since Wednesday. The utmost order prevails. Military police patrol the streets but not a stick of furniture, not even an apple from the trees, has been taken. A sentry has been placed before each store and the soldiers are allowed to enter and purchase what they require. Everything is so peaceful that the inhabitants express the utmost surprise, as it had been diligently reported that the British occupation meant instant

Judging from the conversation of the inhabitants, the Free State is weary of the war. It is openly said that President Steyn betrayed the people. When the latter became satisfied there was no truth in the stories of the looting proclivities of the British, the town's people welcomed the troops as friends. Since the battle of the Modder River the town has not been garrisoned, but has been merely used garrisoned, but has been merely used as a hospital depot. When the Boers fired on the British Wednesday, the townspeople protested. Although the British shelling considerably frightened the women, the shells were only directed at a ridge beyond the town, which was intrenched. The German hospital remains in beautiful order. It is clean and sanitary and the wounded of both sides are equally well attended.

A correspondent talked with a number of the Boer wounded, and they all acknowledged that the British movements had nonplussed the burgher commanders. Even now, it is added, they are under the impression that the sole object was the capture of Jacobs-dal. When informed of the relief of Kimberley, they were at first incredu-lous and then astounded. The land-rost remains in the town.

thing! Crossing the Legs and Appendicitis. It was recently announced by a weilknown medical man that the reason men suffer so much from dyspepsia is because the stomach is crowded out of position and cannot readily perform its proper functions. Now comes a surgeon, who put forward the suggestion that appendicitis is common because of the habit of sitting with one leg thrown over the other.

Many causes have been quoted for appendicitis but none has satisfac orly explained wby men should more frequently suffer from the disease than women. "The habit of sitting with the legs crossed," says the surgeon, "restricts the action of the digestive apparatus, especially of the lower intestine, and causes stagnation of the contents and the stretching of the opening of the vermiform appendix, making it possible for obstructions to reach the latter organ and thus causing appendi citis. The appendix is only loosely attached to the caecum, the portion where the small intestine joins the large intestine, and there is always some half-digested food in the caccal bag. By crossing the legs, and it is generally the right leg that is put up-on the stretch, the undigested food passes into the vermiform appeadix and sets up an inflammation. In the space of a few hours pathological prucesses set in and an attack of appendicitis has been developed."
