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

Washington, March 8.—A Swedish army officer has patented an air torpedo of a construction heretofore unknown, and received a government subsidy for exploiting it, according to a communication to the state department from Consul-General Guenther, at Frankfort, Germany. According to the patent specifications, the motion of the projectile is caused exclusively by a force which is developed in the torpedo little by little from ignition of a gas generated from slowly burning material. The pressure of the gas gradually becoming stronger, propels the torpedo? by the arrangement which allows the gas to escape. Once in motion, the torpedo increases its speed in accordance with the amount of gas pressure. The charge may consist of any explosive provided the same is ignited only by the shocks or Battery, R.
