Wide Differences Between the City Engineer's Figures and Those of Bell Telephone Co.

The Court of Revision on civic assessment met last evening. Sheriff Gemmill, Ward Staworth and the City Clerk were present. The following appeals were dealt with:

D. W. Crow, John Reeve appearing, 24 and part 22, w. s. St. Clair street. The assessment had been raised this year from \$2500 to \$2800. The house had only cost, \$2544.48 to build, including sewer, drain and repairs—reduced to \$2500 again.

William Baby, C. P. R. Hotel property, assessed at \$10,000.—Laid over. On motion the division was made between Geo. A. Young and Dale and Galbraith as follows:

Mr. Richards said if this property was assessed as a going concern then he objected. He could put in a statement which would show that an assessment of \$702 should be made. This didn't include instruments.—Laid over.
