### WITHDRAWS RONDEAU

Toronto, Oct. 12.1-Under the authority of the Mines Act, an order-in-council has been passed withdrawing from exploration, location and sale any part of the Rondeau Provisional Park, and satting the same apart, pending exploration, under the direction of the Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines. The action of the Government is in the nature of precautionary measures. Prospecting and boring for oil and gas has been actively carried on in the immediate neighborhood of the Park and it is decided to make it quite plain that they cannot go on the Park unless the Government sees fit to grant permission.

### A GOOD WELL

The highest producing oil well that has yet been struck in Harwich Township was drilled into last Thursday at a depth of 500 feet.

The well is located on the famous Richardson farm and is producing fifty barrels of oil daily. The well has not been shot, and if it continues to produce in such abundance as it is at present, it will not be necessary to do so. Contractor Ivinson, who drilled it in, says that it is the best well that he has ever such in the Township of Harwich. It is owned by a new company known as the Thames River Oil & Gas Company, which is formed of a number of capitalists from Toronto and Tillssonburg. The recent well is their third good well and is indeed an encouragement to the new company.


