They think, because they live in St. Louis, a cyclone can never destroy them, as Louisville, Ky., and Gainesville, Ga., were destroyed. Oh, they they can think of certhousekes and Gainesville, Ga., were destroyed. On, yes, they can think of earthquakes and tornadoes and tidal waves 1,000, 2,000 or even 3,000 miles away from home. They may even picture one in Charleston, but not one at their own doorsteps. Like a flash out of a clear sky came the destruction of the city of San Francisco at the Golden Gate. Like a flash death may come stalking along, and come pounding at your door and mine, as it came and toppled over the massive walls of the metropolis of the Pa-

Now, amid all these scenes of destruction and sorrow that have come to our bereft sister city, I send to these suffering people words of congratulation and good cheer.
