I. O. G. T. Going on to Victory.

This order which 44 years ago only had
one Lodge with about a dozen members,
to-day has 13,000 Lodges and 600,000
members. About 60 Lodges have been
put up in this province.

The Grand Lodge agent, Mr. B. D.
Rogers, has been addressing meetings
every night for over two weeks in King's
and Annapolis counties. Last week he
organized Lodges at South Farmington
on Monday, and Paradise West on Wed-
nesday evenings. At South Farmington
Rev. W. C. Brown is Deputy, C. H.
Shaffer C. T., and H. M. Phinney P. C.
T. Evergreen Lodge, at Paradise West,
has W. A. Poole for Lodge Deputy, and
both Lodges meet on Tuesday and have
excellent prospects of success.

On Sunday, 10th inst., Mr. Rogers ad-
dressed the children in the Annapolis
W. C. T. U. rooms in the afternoon, and
in the evening a Lodge Gospel Tem-
perance meeting in the Methodist church.
The evening Rev. Mr. Strathairn,
Mayor King and Geo. E. Corbett also
delivered stirring addresses on the tem-
perance question.

Mr. Rogers' programme this week is as
follows:
Monday, 11th, meeting at Kingston
Station to organize a Lodge. Tuesday,
12th, at District Lodge meeting 10 a. m.
2 p. m., and a public meeting in the
evening at Tremont. And public tem-
perance meetings will be held with the
Lodges at Kingsport on Wednesday 13th,
Arlington 14th, and Delhaven on Friday
15th. He will probably be present at
Acadia Lodge on Saturday evening and
may address a meeting in town on Sun-
day, after which he goes home for a
short rest and will then conduct a series
of temperance meetings in Halifax and
Hants counties.
