A Double Jubilee.

On Tuesday, July 7th, the Presbytery of Halifax met at Casard in regular quarterly session and in the afternoon put through a goodly amount of business. The meeting in the evening was in honor of Rev. M. G. Henry and Dr. Andrew Burrows and the house was filled. These two men had both attained the distinction of serving for fifty years in the work of the ministry. Rev. R. N. Bell had been made chairman of a committee with this celebration in charge and no detail had been neglected.

The moderator, James Falconer, presided, and with him on the platform were Mr. Bell, Mr. Beale, Mr. Henry and Dr. Burrows. Rev. Mr. Beale led in prayer, after which the moderator introduced Dr. Burrows. Dr. A. B. Dickie, of Hantsport, and Dr. Forrest spoke on his behalf. These three men have been closely associated all their lives and the friendship between them is very real. Beautiful indeed was the tribute they paid him.

Mr. Henry has been a most efficient, faithful and hard working minister. He sought hard fields and won them. His first charge was Clyde and Barrington, a place of high seas, where bonfires and true hearts abound and where Mr. Henry is still affectionately remembered. His other charges were Subenscadie and St. Croix.

Mr. Henry was then presented with \$100, a gift from friends in his old congregation, and \$45 from the members of his family.

Mr. Henry was deeply moved by the words that had been spoken but he replied most fittingly. He had no regrets for having chosen the ministry as his life's work. He only regretted that he had not loved more and prayed more and thus accomplished more.

Mr. Henry is leaving Nova Scotia and will take up his residence near where his children are settled in the United States. His departure from Nova Scotia is a distinct loss. He is a true man and the affectionate regards of many people in the province will follow him and his good wife wherever they go.

The whole service at Casard was most delightful. The choir, under the leadership of Mrs. Dickie, provided good music and Mr. Pearson, a student of Knox College, Toronto, now laboring at Baxter's Harbour, sang a solo. The hospitality of the people knew no bounds and all things seemed to work together to make this meeting of Presbytery a splendid success.
