Calgary, June 14, 1910.

Dear Sir:

I suppose the people of Cardston would like to know what kind of camp we were going to. We, that is the advance party arrived in Calgary 10.30 Saturday night last. We stayed at an hotel till Sunday morning. We then marched out to the camp, not knowing the way, we did a good five miles. The camp is three miles from the city. When we arrived there were only three tents up, we helped the General Staff to put up theirs, then we put our own up.

Colonel Cruikshank's complimented our Sergeant-Major, (Mr. Terry) on the way our camp was pitched. We have sixteen tents and a large marquee.

There also here the 19th Alberta Mounted Rifles, 15th Light Horse and the Battery from Lethbridge. There are about 200 tents up this morning. The weather is fine. We expect the boys this afternoon and we are going to Calgary to meet them.
