All hens are prone to become broody at times, especially at this season. Even the so-called non-setting varieties, such as the Leghorns, become broody. If this broodiness is tolerated, if the hens are permitted to remain on the nests, they are soon thrown out of laying condition, and the egg yield from the flock will diminish at an alarming rate.

Furthermore, if hot weather is at hand, broodiness will hasten the molt, and to the undernourished condition of the broody hens. Needless to say, an early molt is detrimental to a heavy egg yield.

break up the inclination. ies sometime csalled litters. Between series there is a rest period, maybe a couple of days, maybe a week or longer, depending upon the productive nses of the hen.

At such time it is natural for the hen to become broody and show signs of a maternal instinct—a desire to batch and rear a brood of c hicks. Undisturbed, this inclination grows upon the hen; very soon she becomes an out-and-out sitter. On the other hand, if the inclination is dicsovered, if she is driven from the nest and kept from the nest or anything that resembles a nest, particularly if she is kept from any seculsion or privacy, it usually follows that she abandons the idea in a day or two and returns to the rest of the flock, whereupon the succeeding series of eggs is developed and she goes on laying.


Broodiness Hastens the Molt. Let a hen dwell upon the nest for a week or two and the next series of eggs ceases to develop. The egg organs revert to a dormant, contracted state, from which it may take a month or two to stimulate them to the point of production. Meanwhile, the season has advanced and there is risk of the hen entering the molt before she re-

sumes laying. Many practices have been devised for breaking up broody hens, and in the past many of them, in fact, most of them, have depended upon some form of punishment. This is all wrong. It is perfectly natural for the hen to want to hatch her eggs. Except for this instinct, in the days before incubators same into general use, rearing young stock would have been


exceedingly troublesome, if not im-Thus, to inflict harsh treatment on the hen simply because she responds to the natural impulse is unreasonable, cruel and inhuman. Apart from these considerations, top unish or ill-treat a hen runs counter to the caretaker's best interests. Bad treat ment further retards egg production, whereas production should be encour aged, stimulated.

Water cures, starvation, exposure and similar methods are not to be recommended under any circumstances. And they are unnecessary. It must be admitted, of course, that most sitting hens are perverse and trying to one's patience. Sometimes the most patient caretaker is moved to a spirit of: "What wouldn't I give to wring that chicken's neck!" But don't fall for the temptation, because it is in the nature of a hen to be persistent. If it were not so she would not remain faithful to the work

bring off her brood. In mild, pleasant weather the "broodies" can be turned into a yard and made to sleep outdoors. Do what you will with them to distract the inclination to sit, provided they are not injured, frightened or impaired in any way, By all means feed and water them liberally.

The chief consideration is to segregate the hens as soon as they become! broody, if possible on the first day. A hen removed from the nest at this time is very much easier to discourage than when she has been allowed to indulge her fancy for a week or

To insure getting the "broodies" at an early stage, the poultry keeper should make it a hard and fast rule to go over the nests every evening about an hour before sundown, during the spring and summer months, and clots is to candle the eggs. to remove therefrom any hens found at this time. It is a most troublesome vice and will cause considerable mortality

in short order. The real cause of the trouble is in keeping the chicks too closely confined indoors and with nothing to occupy their attention. Give them more freedom outdoors, or if they must be confined, keep them hustling in litter for scratch grains.

Conditions That Cause Runts.

pearance of the flock. If the incubator is run too high in temperature it will produce a premature hatch; if it is run too low it will bad. Hens' eggs should commence to pip on the twenthieth day, and the hatch should be completed the day following.

Chickens were never intended to thrive on bare ground. Dig up the yards and runs and sow them to rye, eats or rape, or a combination of these, which purifies the soil and furn ishes green food.

Muslin curtains and screens which were used in the fronts of houses last winter, and which are no longer required, should be brushed off, marked with the number of the house or location and put away under cover for safekeeping. A loft is a convenient storage place. Don't keep them out in the weather unnecessarily. The muslin or other fabric coverings has to be replaced all too quickly at best. It is safe to ship baby chicks any distance that can be covered in fortyeight hours' transportation, provided the little fellows are started on their journey shortly after they are hatch-

HEALTH HINTS To cure a headache, Nurse says to make a weak cup of tea, adding four cloves to it. Drink it as hot as possible. After the tea has been taken it is a good plan to lie down flat on the back for ten or fifteen minutes. Bathing the head in cold water, to which a teaspoon of common salt has been added, is also a good thing, and it helps to reduce the temperature of
