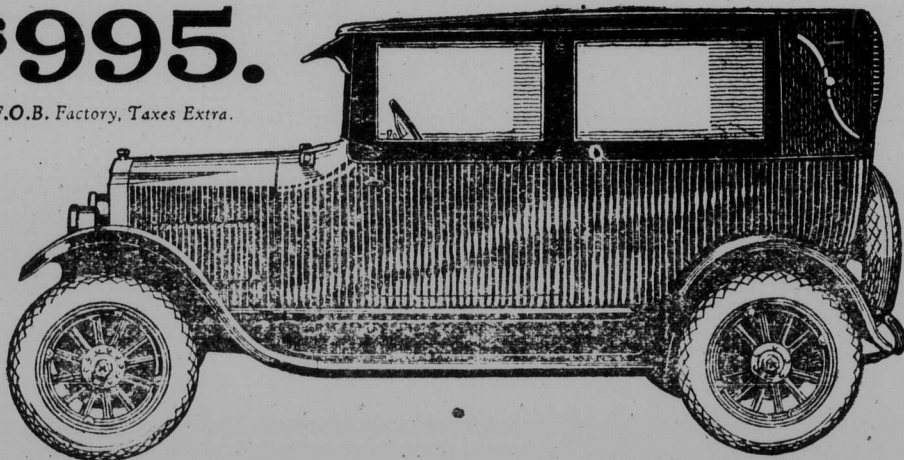

MIXED FARMING

Mr. D'Arcy Scott recently addressed a number of public meetings in the Western Provinces whither he had gone as Secretary and Treasurer of the Dairy Council of Canada. He told his audiences in plain terms that, if the West is to prosper, more attention must be devoted to mixed farming. The fact that the wheat farmers have had in the last seven years more poor crops than good ones, emphasises Mr. Scott's contention.

It is worth while for some of the potato growers of New Brunswick to give some attention to the advice of Mr. Scott. Their experience this year should be sufficient to turn their thoughts toward mixed farming. Perhaps we should say their experiences during the last three or four years should have that effect. The farmer who has some dairy stock, some pigs, some grain and vegetables, some poultry and fruit, can better suffer the ills of a poor potato crop or a demoralized potato market than the gambler who risks all on one throw and expects to grow rich in a season through the production of a single crop. The temptation that assails the wheat grower comes also to the potato farmer, but it should be resisted. The farmer who has enough as a result of mixed farming operations to take care of his family, can much better endure the results of a poor potato crop or a bad market. One of the most depressing sights on the prairie is a group of rather neglected looking farm buildings without a tree or a shrub, or any attempt whatever to make an attractive home. These are usually the homes of what is called the wheat miner, who goes in expecting to acquire wealth in very few years and then his him to some other clime. He is not a benefit to the country, and it is satisfactory to learn that his tribe is not increasing.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Ottawa, Ont., April 4, 1925.
Editor of the Carleton Observer,
Hartland, N. B.

Dear Sir:
I have no intention of following up a newspaper controversy with Messrs. Hatfield and Company or the New Brunswick Potato Exchange, or with whoever is writing the articles for them, which have been appearing in your paper, but there are so many inaccuracies in their effort of March 28th that I feel I should, at least, make some corrections.

Quoted from the above article: "Mr. Caldwell also states that he is in favour of higher duty on American potatoes entering Canada or duty equal to amount of it on Canadian potatoes entering United States. On looking over Hansard, we cannot find where Mr. Caldwell has even brought up this subject in Parliament."

If Messrs. Hatfield and Company had wanted to be fair, they could have told you that Mr. H. H. Hatfield was one of a delegation which came to Ottawa in 1922 to interview the Government with regard to this very matter, and that I arranged a meeting between said delegation and the Minister of Agriculture, and put up their case in the presence of Mr. Hatfield along the following lines:

1. That our Government should endeavor to make some reciprocal arrangements with the United States whereby our potatoes might enter the United States free of duty. Failing in this, that they should increase the Canadian duty on American potatoes entering Canada to the same rate as the American duty on Canadian potatoes entering United States, and I have repeatedly urged this upon the Government, especially, during the past winter."

It is true that this has not appeared in Hansard, as it has been by way of interviews with the different Ministers, which I find is the most effective way of getting things done, although I regret to say I have not been able to get action in this matter so far.

Another statement I wish to correct is the following: "We believe that Mr. Caldwell understands the potato business, as he was at one time President and Director of a company that handled potatoes, and lost in one year for the farmers of this district over \$50,000."

I wish to say that while I was President of the United Farmers' Association I never was President of the United Farmers' Co-operative Co. nor had anything to do with the handling or selling of the potatoes above referred to.

In answer to the query at the end of Hatfield and Company's letter: "Why were three shippers of the St. John Valley separated out and named as the alleged combine in Mr. Caldwell's affidavit instead of taking all of the fifteen or twenty New Brunswick shippers that were paying the same price and selling at the same price in Cuba?"

In view of the fact that this matter is now under investigation by a Tribunal set up by the Government for the investigation of such matters, I feel that it is improper to discuss it through the press until a report of the findings of the said Tribunal is made public.
